



Everyday Metanoia



Today is the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. St. Paul's message really hit home this week. As I read and reflected upon it, I saw a very short bridge between the world of St. Paul and our world. Let me explain. "Brothers and sisters: I should like you to be free of anxieties." Is that not the story of many of our lives the past few years, and for some, longer than that? Anxiety has become a hot topic and a big business. To our detriment, I feel that we do not give our mental and spiritual health the same time, attention and money that we give our physical health. Anxiety is a very real mental condition, but typical of our culture, it has become a popular and misused catchphrase and media sound byte. The Mayo Clinic gives this short

overview on anxiety: "Experiencing occasional anxiety is a normal part of life. However, people with anxiety disorders frequently have intense, excessive and persistent worry and fear about everyday situations." As I was researching and reflecting on Paul's message, I ran across an article from the New York Times which was the starting point for my "lightbulb" moment. The article was titled "New Year's Resolutions for Dealing with Anxiety", but really what most of the article talked about was stress and not anxiety. I feel that this is more what St. Paul was talking about - stress; and basic worrying, produced by the many choices that face us everyday and our human desire to try to do and have it all.

The Corinthians were a lot like our present culture and Church. George T. Montague, SM, has this to say in the introduction to his reflection and commentary on First Corinthians, "Imagine that in a dream one night you find yourself in a parish where there are several drunks at Sunday Mass; where some members are claiming that there is no resurrection of the dead and that Jesus is not really present in the Eucharist; the parishioners are divided into cliques and factions; the present of the Altar Society is not talking to the head catechist; there is public unchallenged adultery and many marriages are in disarray; a group is dabbling in New Age Spirituality; the liberals, the charismatics and the traditionalists are all trumpeting their version of the church; and Masses are abbreviated for the sake of Sunday football - one of the many signs the parish has compromised heavily with the surrounding secular culture. A nightmare? Not exactly. You were just experiencing a modern version of the community in Corinth."

So after a good laugh as I realize that 56 AD church life is not any different than 2024 AD church life (the short bridge I mentioned earlier), I started to wonder what being unmarried or married has to do with Paul's message and how does that play into our relationship with God and the covenantal relationship we have? I think what Paul was trying to say is that when we marry, by necessity, our focus and time commitments change. Another person, and possibly persons if we have children, are now needing some of our resources, specifically time. The ideal Christian for St. Paul is one who is free to and chooses to prioritize and give their resources freely to God. While I understand Paul's thought process, I am sure that in real life, the single and the widow still had much to worry about that diverted their attention from God in Corinth in 56 A.D. Not unlike the parables of Jesus, though, I feel that Paul was trying to get his message across with an example to which the people could easily relate. I get the marriage application and I am sure that Paul's audience, the Christian citizens of Corinth, got it too.

What's the message then that relates both to 56 A.D. and to 2024 A. D. for the Christian? The message is about putting God first and how that needs to be a deliberate decision and choice everyday because the world pulls our attention and resources elsewhere. It may be more difficult for those who have responsibilities to others, such as a spouse, children or even an aging parent. There is a really good book called Having a Mary Heart in a Martha World that addresses this and gives practical suggestions for positive change and reflective prayer. We think that we live in a complicated and demanding era, compared to that of our ancestors, but, do we really? At the end of the day, it is still about valuing and prioritizing our life and relationship with God, as it was when Paul was writing to the Corinthians. It does not matter if you are male or female, married or single, how can we let go of some of our Martha ways so that we can sit at the feet of Jesus like Mary? God gives us the gift of free will, how do we return and honor that gift with God, ourselves and others in a world that values productivity and busyness above all else? And speaking of choices...

And so, I invite you to attend Mass this weekend (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent, invite them to join you! Praying with you always.







The Importance of Authority

Jesus began to teach in the synagogues, and people listened to him. On one occasion a possessed man entered and began to shout at Jesus. The people were astonished when Jesus drove the evil spirit out of him. Jesus' fame began to spread throughout

Jesus is listened to because he teaches with authority. The tone of his voice, his inflection, makes people take notice. Projecting that image of authority is important for parents too. I learned that lesson when my oldest son was five.

As a youngster I hated hearing my parents say, "Because I told you so." When my first child was born I resolved that I would never say those words to my children.

It took me five years to realize the importance of developing a voice and look that conveyed those words of absolute authority.

I was feeding two toddlers when my oldest came in the house, accidentally bringing in a huge wasp. Big flying bugs scare me silly, but I knew I could not show panic. I would take care of the wasp—after my children were safely away. I asked Roger Andy to take his brother and sister out of the room. Instead of moving toward them, he sat down and asked me, "Why?" My quick explanation was met with another, "Why?" By the third "Why?", I met his eye, gave him the look, and in a monotone two octaves lower than normal, commanded: "Because I told you so." He grabbed his two siblings and left.

Later, I thanked him for rescuing Kristin and James. I would like to say I proceeded to answer all his questions about wasps, but I didn't (I was never the perfect mom). But I did learn an important lesson that day. There are certain times when a parent needs to speak with attention-getting authority. Make sure one of those times is when you are talking about the gospel—delivered in your everyday voice and without "the look."

FAMILY RESPONSE

Discuss the different people of authority in your lives. Help your children understand that even adults have people who have power over them.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

How do you respond to authority? Are you careful in how you use your authority over your children? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?


