Q: Who can pick up a food box? A: Anyone who needs food!

Did you know that anyone who requests a food box can pick up groceries on our distribution days? Anyone in need can call our office and get onto the Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday schedule. All we ask is their name, household size, and phone number. No IDs, no income qualifiers, no other details needed. We do require that they set up ahead of time so our pantry volunteers can prepare enough boxes.

We add new families each week. Many of our clients come regularly, some only come once or twice per year. For many, MCO is the first place that is called for assistance.

The items in our food boxes of non-perishable items and toiletries add up to about \$70 per box. In addition, fresh items are added to each box at distribution - milk, meat, produce, bread.

Our clients come from every neighborhood, social class, income bracket, ethnicity. Every person has a story of need at some point in their lives, and thanks to our generous parishes and caring parishioners, those experiencing food insecurity can receive immediate assistance from MCO. We are also prepared to refer clients to other local organizations for other needs.


Yes, Lord, I Believe

Lent is Just Around the Corner

Here are a few details regarding our upcoming Lenten activities:



- Ash Wednesday is February 14. Mass and ash distribution will be at 8:15 & 5:30 pm in the sanctuary.
- Be on the lookout for the parish Lenten book, “*Yes, Lord, I Believe: A Sing-Along Celebration of the Creed*”. This will be distributed free of charge the weekend of February 10 and 11 and will be available at the church entryway after that.
- Begin contemplating your prayer, fasting and almsgiving plans: All Saints will have Stations of the Cross & Mass on Tuesday evenings during Lent beginning at 5:30 pm. with a soup supper to follow.

What is Lent and What Should We Do?

From the USCCB: Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms and we practice self-control through and fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ.

Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: “*Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs.*” (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2446).

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards.

Eucharistic Adoration will be held each Monday evening during Lent from 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. in the chapel. It will start on Monday, February 19th and the last night of Adoration will be held on Monday, March 18th.



Communal Anointing of the Sick

During Mass February 10 & 11



During his ministry on earth, Jesus had a particular concern for sick people; he healed them not just with a word of power, but also with a human and compassionate touch.

The Anointing of the Sick, like all sacraments, is one way that the church continues the ministry of Jesus. Through it, Christ continues to touch, heal, and comfort. The Letter of James attests that this practice has always been part of ministry: “Is anyone among you sick? He should summon the presbyters of the church, and they should pray over him and anoint [him] with oil in the name of the church” (5:14).

While the sacrament is often administered individually, the church encourages celebrating it within Mass. Many parishes celebrate it on one or more Sundays each year. The sacrament may be received by a baptized person who “begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age,” according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (1514)—seriously ill, but not necessarily near death—so it may not be apparent that someone receiving the sacrament is ill. The communal celebration reminds us that suffering is part of our human condition and may move us to look on each other with the compassion of Christ the healer. Celebrating this sacrament during Mass also helps us unite our sufferings with Christ’s as we recall his body broken and his blood poured out for us.

Stations of the Cross




Are you interested in participating more fully in the Liturgy this Lenten Season?



Everyday Metanoia



Today is the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time. This has been quite the week and I feel like I lived just the tiniest portion of what Jesus experienced in today's Gospel. It seemed like every text message, Google chat, email, phone call and knock on the office door brought a new opportunity to serve others. And I love to do that, but...by Thursday, I noticed that my energy was definitely dwindling. I know that Jesus loved to teach, heal, laugh, cry and just be with God's children, but Jesus also experienced the feelings and circumstances of humanity - exhaustion being one of those. In his humanity, Jesus may have also wondered how there could ever be enough of him and enough time to accomplish all that he felt he was called to do. Ever feel that way? I do.

So - what's the answer? Our world today values and rewards busyness. But at what cost? Mental illness, anxiety, burn out and the physical ailments that accompany these are on the rise. One can hardly go a day without seeing a new article, podcast or Facebook post about ways to "deal with" this. They range all the way from practical suggestions to potentially dangerous practices.

I am always amazed (not in a good way) how we love to think that we are so important and so smart that we in essence, always need to recreate the wheel. There are new advances and ideas, and that is fantastic, but I feel that sometimes we need to wear the cloak of humility more and listen rather than always seek and do. How does all of this apply to today's Gospel? When Jesus was weary, exhausted and potentially burned out - He turned to prayer.

"The best medicine for a weary soul is prayer," Pope Francis said with a reminder that like many medical treatments, consistency is key. "We often focus on so many urgent but unnecessary things. We occupy and preoccupy ourselves with so many secondary realities. And perhaps without even recognizing it, we neglect what counts the most and we allow our love for God to grow cold, to grow cold bit by bit. Today, Jesus offers us the remedy to rekindle a tepid faith. And what is the remedy? Prayer. Yes, prayer is the medicine for faith, it is the restorative of the soul."

One could respond that it is not my soul that is weary, it's my mind, my patience, and even my physical being. How will prayer help with that? Robert J. Wicks in his book, *Prayerfulness: Awakening to the Fullness of Life*, defines prayerfulness as "being in the present with your eyes wide open to experiencing God and life in dynamic new ways." He continues, "The key elements of spiritual intimacy in the time allotted to us on earth are fairly straightforward. They are, in order of importance: Love God deeply, do what you can for others, and please, take good care of yourself. But this is easier said than done...Prayerfulness, in its purest form, is true receptivity to the essential lessons needed to live a full life. And even when we are lost or resistant to a much needed new perspective, spiritual mindfulness can actually position us to be surprised by grace." Reflecting on how this past week had progressed I just realized several things: 1) I had a tight grip on the steering wheel of life, 2) I not only wasn't wearing the cloak of humility, it was wadded up and stuffed in the back of the closet, and 3) I was exhausted not from the requests, but from the endless series of "what ifs" that I had let take front and center in my mind. I was making life complicated and it was wearing me out.

John H. Wright in his book, *A Theology of Christian Prayer*, adds this to the conversation: "Within prayer itself our mental activity tends to become more simple, less complicated. The beginning of a life of prayer is usually quite discursive, occupied with much reasoning, reflecting, questioning, comparing, forming convictions and attitudes. This is very important, but this activity becomes less varied and diffuse as the truth is grasped and relished in a simple look. It is now not so much a matter of discovery as it is a tranquil possession . In the contemplation of the life of Jesus analysis leads more and more to synthesis; the 'what' leads more directly and deeply into the 'who.'"

That 'who' is our Triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We are sent forth every week after Mass - out into the world to encounter and respond to all of its challenges and opportunities. But we are also called to return every week (or everyday) to hear God's word, to pray and to be refreshed. And then we are sent back out again. Life can easily become an endless wasteland of exhaustion, anxiety and burn out if we do not let ourselves sit in the oasis of prayer on a regular basis. It is key to remember that each person's journey is unique. Thomas Merton is quoted as saying, "No one can give you a map [in regards to your spiritual life]...your terrain is unique." Read books, listen to Catholic/Christian podcasts, be a part of spiritual formation groups - it is good, but it is only through consistent personal prayer that God will surprise you with your own unique graces that will heal, empower and refresh you.

And so, I invite you to attend Mass this weekend (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent, invite them to join you! Praying with you always.

God's Messengers

Jesus is born in Bethlehem, and following Jewish law, he is circumcised eight days later. While Mary and Joseph are at the Temple for this ritual, they encounter two people. Simeon is a very old and devoted man. God has promised him that he would not die until he had set eyes on the Christ. Anna is an elderly prophetess. They both proclaimed Jesus as Israel's salvation.

On the night of Jesus' birth, the shepherds came to the stable to see if the message they received from the angels was true. How wonderful it must have been for Mary to hear their amazing story. Eight days later, when Jesus is taken to be circumcised, two others proclaim Jesus' greatness. Simeon and Anna and the shepherds reaffirmed for Mary the message to which she had said yes to nine months earlier.

Jesus' mother was certainly a woman of faith, but I wonder what went through her mind when Joseph told her there was no room for them at the inns. She must have been concerned about giving birth to the future Messiah in a stable. No doubt, Joseph made the space as clean and comfortable as possible. But Mary was a first-time mom, away from her family in a strange town; she must have been afraid and confused.

In the afterglow of giving birth, Mary undoubtedly forgot all of her concerns. Certainly her faith was reaffirmed as she looked at her beautiful baby boy. However, God, being a gracious God, also sent the shepherds, Simeon, and Anna so they could confirm the message, leaving no doubt in Mary's mind that all was well.

God may not send shepherds or prophets, but if we keep our eyes and ears open we may well discover God's messengers in our own life, people who affirm our faith and let us know that all is well. Like Mary, we need to remember those moments, reflecting on them often in our hearts, especially in times when our faith needs a lift.


