Celebrate the Gift of Employment

LEARN

Work is an essential part of our lives. We may look forward to days off, but work defines us and our society. In fact, "The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers" is one of the Catholic church's social teachings. Pope Francis refers to work in several of his papal letters. In one excerpted on the *United States Catholic Conference of Bishops web site*, he says, "Work is a necessity, part of the meaning of life on this earth, a path to growth, human development and personal fulfillment." **How lucky we are to live in a society that values work, fair labor practices and just wages.**

In Haiti, things aren't so easy. Even before the current unrest the country is experiencing because of gang activity, many Haitians were out of work. *According to the United Nations*, approximately 13.9% were unemployed in 2022. *Another source* reported unemployment rate closer to 15% at that time. In comparison, *Iowa had an unemployment rate of 3% in 2022*. Those who do find work in Haiti are subject to low wages that often don't keep up with the cost of living. Haiti's *average annual income in 2021 was \$2,900*, while *Iowans earned an average of \$57,000 that year*.

Like our state, Agriculture is an important part of Haiti's economy. It is the country's largest sector and *accounts for about 66% of its workforce*, particularly in the rural community where our sister parish, Notre Dame de Lourdes, is located. However, unlike Iowa, many farmers must use their crops to sustain themselves. Common crops include cassava (a drought-resistant root vegetable that can be ground into flour), plantains, bananas, corn, yams, sweet potatoes and rice.

DO

- Take time this week to write down things you are grateful for at school or work.
- Perform a random act of kindness for someone at school or work.
- Refrain from complaining about work- or school-related issues, both in the workplace/at school and at home.

PRAY

More than anything, Haiti needs our prayers right now. Please pray for the people of Haiti as they **H.O.P.E.** for the end of chaos and the return of peace to their country. This week in particular, we reflect on their employment challenges:

- **Help one another through prayer** Pray for an increase in employment opportunities for Haitians.
- **Open one's heart to God and to fellow man** Pray for those committing acts of violence in the country of Haiti, that their eyes be opened, hearts converted and end their evil ways.
- **Pray daily for world peace** Pray for peace on the streets of Haiti, so residents can reopen their businesses, find employment and travel to and from work more safely.
- Enable to give others strength through our example Reflect and give thanks for your gift of employment.

Everyday Metanoia



Today is Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion. The words shared will be brief today as I want to encourage all of us to fully immerse ourselves in the events of today and the week ahead. Let's put ourselves into the crowd, into each of the main characters of today and the week - explore feelings, thoughts and prayers that may arise.

The reading from Isaiah is full of wisdom, truth and encouragement. It is a foreshadowing of the life of Jesus for the week ahead, but I hope it speaks to all of us in a personal way, too. "The Lord GOD has given me a well-trained tongue, that I might know how to speak to the weary a word that will rouse them." God has given us all valuable gifts that are to be fed through the liturgy, through study and through prayer, and then shared with our families and communities to build up one another; to make the world a better place. The Faith Formation Committee in conjunction with our formation staff members have been working on opportunities to help define those gifts in each of us and then events and programs that will help to refine and grow those gifts to serve our brothers and sisters close at hand and those further away. Please pray for the work happening to bring these to our parish and for the hand of God to direct our every move.

"Morning after morning he opens my ear that I may hear; and I have not rebelled, have not turned back." Reconciliation is a grace-filled sacrament, but there is much fruit to be received through an end of the day daily examination of conscience, too. In the process of reviewing the day and our actions, attitudes and words throughout that day, God reveals moments of sin and gives us the opportunity to repent and re-open our hearts, minds, eyes and ears afresh each and every day. This kind of humility, modeled for us in Christ is the foundation for responding to others and leading through word and example.

"I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who plucked my beard; my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting. The Lord GOD is my help, therefore I am not disgraced; I have set my face like flint, knowing that I shall not be put to shame." This stanza of Isaiah comes to life for us in the readings for Palm Sunday and Holy Week. This is a great challenge. How do we find the balance between honest humility and letting others walk all over us? Jesus in his journey to and at the cross lived this. Are we supposed to live this passage literally? "The Lord God is our help." I feel that a relationship with God is the key for discovering, refining and authentically living our own personal path in this life on earth. We are not supposed to do this all on our own, but with God. Through weekly or daily liturgy, through prayer, through reconciliation and examinations of conscience - we listen for God's word with open ears and follow the path of Christ that God wills.

And so, I invite you to attend Mass this weekend (and then the next and the next...) Enter into Holy Week as if you were there. Lord, open our ears to hear you this week and everyday so that we may be living examples of Christ on earth and lead those who do not know your love to you. May this be a most challenging but fruitful Holy Week for all of us.

Family Ministry

March 24, 2024 • Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion • Mark 14:32–72, 15:1-39,40–47

The Passion

Once again we hear the reading of Jesus' passion. This year we read Mark's version. Like the other Gospels, it is a long, wellstaged narrative that covers Jesus' last days from his anointing with oil to his crucifixion on Good Friday.

The Palm Sunday reading from Mark's Gospel is unlike the other Gospel narratives of Jesus' last days. Mark's Gospel begins in Bethany with Jesus being anointed. There is no procession of palms in Mark, but he does take us through the Last Supper, the blessing of the bread and cup, right on to Jesus' death and burial.

Sometimes I think we know the story of Jesus' passion so well that it has lost its drama. We listen to it without really hearing it. Yet those two days in the history of the world had more impact on who we are as a people than the hundreds of millions of years that preceded it.

Through Jesus' life, death and resurrection we can reclaim our heritage as children of God. This is good news. This is big news.

Take some time this week to pick up your Bible, and read the story of Jesus' last days yourself (Mark 14:32–72, 15:1–39). Imagine you are hearing it for the first time. Put yourself in the drama. Stop reading once in a while, close your eyes, and listen for Jesus' voice or the voice of one of the disciples. Read slowly and purposely. Remember the sequence of events.

If you have older children, read the story together. Pause once in while to ask questions. Ask for their questions. If you have younger children, tell them the story. Be as dramatic and compelling as possible. This is the story of our faith, and we each need to claim it as our own.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Read the story of the passion. If you have time this week, go to church and go through the stations of the cross together.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What are your thoughts and feelings as you read the story of Jesus' passion and death? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?
