

Service to Others Metro Catholic Outreach



Volunteers and Donors of All Varieties

Our donors and volunteers come in many shapes, sizes, skill levels, and time commitments.

Some of our volunteers come in once or twice a week or more, some come in every other week, many come once every month or two. Some drop off needed items or money when they are out

and about.

Most of our volunteer shifts last about two hours. We have about 20 different shifts to fill each week, and just under 200 active volunteers to fill them.

We have delivery drivers, who pick up our food orders from HACAP, Aldi's, Sav-A-Lot, and from food donors such as Great Harvest Bread. Many drivers from the parishes bring in the food donations from the churches each week.

Our faithful pantry volunteers sort, check expiration dates, shelve, shop, and pack about 200 food boxes each week. A couple of individuals pop in whenever they have an hour or two, just to assemble homeless bags, put together utensil packets, bag up pet food, or package personal care products.

Our busy office workers answer phones, schedule appointments for food pickup, sort, shelve, and display donations of clothing, food and personal care items, pack and distribute homeless bags. Our office volunteers assist many clients in various ways who end up at MCO looking for help for their families.

Our hardy distribution volunteers show up in all weather conditions on our loading dock to cheerfully greet families arriving for food boxes, organize the distribution of groceries, and load up the food into the clients' vehicles.

We also have several faithful donors who drop off bags or boxes of items for us purchased during their regular shopping trips for their own households, or who order from our Amazon Wish List and have supplies delivered directly here. A few ladies bring in nutritious baked goodies to offer our homeless clients. And countless folks drop off or mail us much needed monetary donations regularly.

And we know that many, many of you reading this are also lifting up Metro Catholic Outreach in your prayers. Each and every component of your participation, whether small or large, is vital to our success in serving God's people in our metro area. We need and appreciate every gift of your time, talent, treasure, and prayers!

Everyday Metanoia



Today's Gospel reading today really hit home on two levels. I am feeling that less may be more this week, so I will ask you to pray with these two short thoughts.

Level one. The two disciples were just sharing the wonderful story of their encounter with Jesus when he reappears in their midst and...they did not know him! How many times do we surrender and hand our lives over to Jesus and then a crisis happens and all of a sudden - we

do not know him. Or life returns to "normal" and we forget him? How many times over the course of our lives do we make Jesus prove himself? "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see..."

Level two. Letting Jesus into the ordinariness of our lives. After Jesus had showed the disciples his feet and his hands (again!), they returned to the state of incredulous joy and amazement. And what does Jesus do? Let's them know that he is hungry and would like something to eat. We hunger and pray for Christ to enter our lives and when that happens we are happy and want to shout it from the rooftops. Jesus celebrates those moments with us, but Christ wants to be a part of every corner of our lives, too, including the very mundane moments like being hungry. One of the great gifts of our Catholic faith is the tradition of prayers. We teach them to the children over the course of their upbringing so that the reality of Jesus is visible in our hearts and minds, not just in the highs and lows, but in the ordinariness of the day. Prayers upon waking, before each meal and prior to bed are not just rote memorized prayers to be uttered mindlessly, but an affirmation that Jesus is in every part of our day. Have we relegated Jesus to the mountains and valleys of our lives? If so, Jesus is here in our midst, has shown us his hands and feet and is wanting to break bread with us in every aspect of our lives. Jesus is knocking. What will our response be?

And so, I invite you to attend Mass this weekend (and then the next and the next...) Let Jesus permeate every part of our lives by first coming and sharing a meal with him.

April 14, 2024 • 3rd Sunday of Easter •Luke 24:35-48

Worth the Risk

The Risen Jesus appears again to the disciples. This time he wants to make sure that they don't think he is some kind of apparition or ghost. So Jesus not only shows them the wounds in his hands and feet, he eats with them. Finally, he opens their minds to understand more clearly the Scriptures.

Jesus was crucified. The disciples who had followed him for years were alone with their questions. Many of them had given up everything to walk with Jesus. They saw him as their Messiah—the Savior of Israel—the person who would reclaim their country's greatness. The great adventure appeared to be all over when, suddenly. Jesus was again in their midst.

In this account of Jesus appearing to his disciples, Jesus shows his wounded hands and feet to all the disciples so they will believe it is he. He asks for food and eats it to prove he is not a ghost. And then the Risen Jesus opens their minds, and they begin to understand all that he taught them. He helps them to rethink Scripture readings they had heard since they were children.

Finally, the disciples get it. Jesus is the Messiah. He is the Savior, but he is savior to more than Israel. Jesus' kingdom stretches beyond time and place. Everything they saw and heard takes on a new meaning. When Jesus died they thought their mission had ended; instead, their great adventure had just begun.

How often do we react as the disciples did, writing off a person because of our limited point of view? How often do we do this to a child, our spouse or a good friend when we don't wait to hear the whole story or explanation? Trust requires patience and sometimes an openness to even the improbable. As we learn from this Gospel it is not easy, but the reward for our trust may be worth the risk.

What do the words "Jesus" and "Savior" mean to you? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are vour concerns?
