You Are Cordially Invited...



Welcome to the Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Today's Gospel speaks to us about the Transfiguration of the Lord. What a miraculous journey that Peter, James and John experienced! If we put ourselves in this story, what emotions come to the surface? Surprise, fear, awe, joy? The journey of life can be like climbing hills and mountains. At the bottom, we often create stories in our mind about what the journey will look like and we pin our hopes and joy on the outcome we create. Pope Francis in his book, The Church of Mercy, asks us to not have a closed mind and heart

and not to be a slave to these "stories." When we walk each step with an approachable and a pliant heart and mind, we allow God to transform our attitude to hopefulness, to an openness to God's surprises and to living in joy. I am reminded of the joke/story about the person who was experiencing a flood. Three times, God sent someone to help, but the person was so fixated on how he envisioned God saving him, that he refused each opportunity and ultimately perished. When the man expressed his anger at God for the outcome, God showed the man each saving moment that he had provided to which the man just would not open his mind. How many of us are like that? I know that I have had plenty of times in my life where I have not allowed God to surprise me with a different outcome than the one I had firmly built for myself. Pope Francis states that our projected outcomes are often tied to "the many idols that take the place of God and appear to offer hope: money, success, power, pleasure." As we close ourselves off and focus on these idols, we often experience "a growing sense of loneliness and emptiness." When we let go of the stories and endings and trust God to be with us and surprise us, "what seems to be cold water, difficulty, sin, is changed..." The light of God as witnessed by Peter, James and John is there for each of us. They did not witness a smoke and magic act, they witnessed the beauty of the pure love of God. Do we allow God to surprise us everyday with that same love and that same hope and joy? Pope Francis encourages us to open our eyes and our hearts to "see the same beauty on the faces of the people who walk beside us every day, such as family, friends, and colleagues. How many luminous faces, how many smiles, how many wrinkles, how many tears and scars reveal love around us?"

I recently returned from a work conference that was attended by a lot of people. I am not an extrovert by nature and was very uncomfortable and anxious at points in the week. And yet, when I allowed God to push me out of my comfort zone, I was surprised to meet and hear the stories of people who encouraged me and gave me the courage to take that next step in hope and joy. "Let us learn to recognize them and to fill our hearts with them. And then let us set out in order to bring the light we have received to others as well, through concrete acts of love diving into our daily occupations more generously; loving, serving, and forgiving with greater earnestness and willingness."

And so, I invite you to Mass (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent or who is seeking God to come into their life, invite them to join you! In the Transfiguration, we know God is pure love and we are created in His image. One small act this week - let God reveal to you one person who is in need of God's love and light at that moment. A smile in a parking lot; an understanding attitude in the check out line; a visit or phone call to a fiend or loved one. Simple done in love and consistently brings the beauty of the Transfiguration everyday to our world. **Love God - Serve Others - Form Disciples**. Praying and hoping with you always.

Announcing Archbishop-elect Zinkula



Dubuque, Iowa – Pope Francis has appointed Most Reverend Thomas R. Zinkula, Bishop of Davenport, as Archbishop of Dubuque. Archbishop-elect Zinkula is scheduled to be installed as the archdiocese's eleventh archbishop on Wednesday, October 18.

Archbishop-elect Zinkula reflected upon his appointment to Dubuque in a statement, saying, "Although I will be sad to leave the Diocese of Davenport in a couple of months, where the diocesan community taught me how to be a bishop and we walked together on our common faith journey, I am humbled and overjoyed to receive the appointment to return to my home diocese to serve as the eleventh archbishop of the Archdiocese of Dubuque."

August 6, 2023 • Transfiguration of the Lord • Matthew 17:1-9

Still Humble

Jesus did some extraordinary things in the Gospel that pointed to his divinity like feeding huge crowds, healing the sick and casting out demons. The reading today gives us a different glimpse of his identity as the Son of God when he was transfigured on the mountain in front of Peter, James, and John.

Some people feel they can relate to the human Jesus best, while others relate to the divine Jesus best. Neither is better than the other, because our Christian tradition has come to teach that Jesus was both fully human and fully God. We'll never understand this with our rational minds because it's one of the mysteries of our faith—Jesus is both/and, human and God.

Plenty of Gospel stories show his human side: his delight in eating and drinking with friends new and old, his fatigue at the end of a long day of helping others, his impatience with others at times, his grief when his friend Lazarus died, etc. Knowing Jesus felt what we feel is helpful to many.

Then there is the story of the Transfiguration that points to Jesus' divinity and his relationship to God as God's son. Yet Jesus is still humble when seen in that light. He doesn't lord it over the apostles or try to coerce them into obedience. He doesn't brag that he is on speaking terms with Moses and Elijah, two of the giants of their history. His concerns for them are only that they not be afraid after hearing the voice from the cloud, and that they not brag about their vision until after his resurrection. The story says a lot about the God we honor. Our God is all-powerful, yet chooses to be humble.

Discuss whether you think of Jesus as more human or more divine (there's no wrong answer). Which is easier for you to relate to and why?

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Spend some time this week imagining God saying to you what God proclaimed to Jesus, "You are my beloved child. With you I am well pleased."
