Dear All Saints Community,

My name is Isabelle Werner. I am honored to serve All Saints as Coordinator of Middle and High School Faith Formation. I have served All Saints for over a year now, and I can confidently say that meeting the youth here at All Saints has been one of the biggest blessings I have ever received. The students here are truly genuine, kind, and faith-filled, each with their passions, gifts, and experiences.

We have more than doubled our youth group attendance, which has been a remarkable experience and has affirmed what we are doing is meaningful and important to the youth of All Saints.

One of the hallmarks of Ablaze Youth Ministry is the one-on-one relationship building between students and adult mentors. However, adjusting to these increasing numbers means we are trying to provide that same level of care to each student, with the same amount of adults.

I gave our youth ministry program the name "Ablaze" not just for the catchy title, but because it harkens back to the story of Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) when the disciples felt their hearts ablaze with the Holy Spirit when sharing in community with Jesus and finally noticing him in the breaking of the bread.

For our students to recognize Jesus, we must share stories, recall scripture, and break bread with them, just as Jesus did with the disciples on the road to Emmaus.

It is vital that adults who are willing and ready to mentor our young people of All Saints Parish connect with this imperative ministry. Ablaze meets every Sunday from 6-7:30 PM, with flexible scheduling for our volunteers. You do not need to have a school-aged child to volunteer, in fact, we strive to have volunteers of all ages and with diverse experiences. Our volunteers have often noted that this experience can mean as much to them as it does to the students we serve.


"Halloween"



A Perfect Pairing - Haiti & Iowa: Medical Care

Our fall fundraiser to support our sister parish, Notre Dame de Lourdes, continues. We invite you to take home one of the photos of the teachers or students hanging around the church and pray for them.

This is the second of three articles that focus on our "Perfect Pairing" with Haiti. The first highlighted our common value of education. Medical care is another way our partnership has made an impact in Haiti. With your generous support, we have financed medical education for two doctors from our sister parish.

The village of Ducrabon is where our sister parish is based and now, the site of a hospital built by Rotary International. Our first exposure to Ducrabon was walking there in 2005 because there was no road. On our way there, we met Amilien, who had plenty of time on the long walk to tell us about his dream to be a doctor. In 2011, the next time we visited Ducrabon, we met Sr. Maria whose assignment was to determine if Ducrabon was a viable site for the Rotary International hospital. The Haiti committee, not knowing about the existence of Sr. Maria nor her assignment, had already decided to support Amilien's medical training. Dr. Amilien recently participated in a cholera medical conference in the village of Djotho. He taught first aid, the importance of clean water and sanitation. Thanks to your support of our Haiti mission, many people benefited from the medical education Amilien received and has been passing on to rural communities in Haiti. It is likely that your kindness and generosity have saved lives. God uses ordinary people to do the unexpected!

Please consider sharing your time by joining the Haiti committee. We need your talents as we continue supporting our sister parish. Please pray for the people of Haiti as they labor to rid their country of gangs and corruption so they can once again live free of violence.

You Are Cordially Invited...



Welcome to the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Last week we talked about the first commandment - You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve. This week we hear the follow up - You shall love your neighbor as yourself.

There are so many great reminders during the month of October that the Church gives us to live the call to love our brothers and sisters. Jesus emphasizes its importance when he identifies the first commandment to love God with all your heart and soul and mind, as the greatest, but then says that

the second is like it. Our Catholic Social Justice teachings emphasize the real need for us to respect life at every stage and through every circumstance that life may bring. We cannot do this if we harbor hatred or lack empathy for our brothers and sisters all over the world. It does not matter the skin color, religion or political stance - we are called to see the face of God in all and to love as God loves us.

Pope Francis speaks to this, "In the middle of the dense forest of rules and regulations — to the legalisms of past and present — Jesus makes an opening through which one can catch a glimpse of two faces: the face of the Father and the face of the brother. He does not give us two formulas or two precepts: there are no precepts nor formulas. He gives us two faces, actually only one real face, that of God reflected in many faces, because in the face of each brother, especially of the smallest, the most fragile, the defenceless and needy, there is God's own image. And we must ask ourselves: when we meet one of these brothers, are we able to recognize the face of God in him? Are we able to do this? "

When we look at the faces of the students and teachers in Haiti, what is our reaction? Do we see nameless faces that leave no impact on us or do we see Jesus reflected in each and every face? Do we see their love shining back at us, even given their very difficult and at times, dire situation? Realistically, we cannot "save" each and every person in need that we see. But we can all make small impacts that add up in a very big way: bringing food for MCO, supporting our brothers and sisters in Haiti through the student fundraiser, giving unused coats to the Knight of Columbus coat drive, helping to serve at funeral luncheons, and participating in our Giving Tree which will begin in a few weeks. This is but the tip of the iceberg. There are many other opportunities to serve our brothers and sisters throughout our community - get involved!

Pope Francis goes on to say, "In effect, the visible sign a Christian can show in order to witness to his love for God to the world and to others, to his family, is the love he bears for his brothers. The Commandment to love God and neighbor is the first, not because it is at the top of the list of Commandments. Jesus does not place it at the pinnacle but at the center, because it is from the heart that everything must go out and to which everything must return and refer."

There is a song in our missal called Now is the Time that beautifully sums up our call to love and serve one another in grateful response to God's love for us. "Spirit of love crush the pain of hatred. Spirit of hope stand before our eyes. Spirit of light dance within our darkness. Make us your own-now is the time. Spirit of peace silence tongues of anger. Spirit of life break the chains of death. Spirit of joy overcome our sadness. Make us your own-now is the time."

Socrates is quoted as saying, "The secret of change is to focus all of your energy not on fighting the old, but on building the new." Now is the time to let go of hatred, violence and most of all indifference with our brothers and sisters. Let's start to build bridges of compassion, assistance, concern, empathy and most of all - love. What would change if we saw the face of God in all that we meet?

And so, I invite you to Mass (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent or who is seeking God to come into their life, invite them to join you! If you have been absent for a while, come back - we need you and love you. **Love God - Serve Others - Form Disciples**. Praying and hoping with you always.

October 29, 2023 • 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time • Matthew 22:34-40

The Greatest Commandment

Jesus' enemies failed in their attempt to trap Jesus into saying something that would get him into trouble with the Romans. They make another attempt to trap him into making a mistake against the Jewish faith. A scholar of the law asks Jesus which commandment is the most important.

A scholar asks, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" and Jesus responds "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind" (v. 37). Jesus adds that the second commandment is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (v. 39). There they are, the two great commandments, and neither of them start with, "thou shalt not." The Ten Commandments (thou shalt and shalt nots) presented to Moses are a somewhat more detailed version of these two great ones.

If we know the greatness of God and love God, we don't hold anything or anyone as more important. We don't use God's name disrespectfully, and we certainly don't use his Son's name, Jesus Christ, as a form of profanity. We honor the day God named holy, the day set aside for spending time with God, by not working like we do during the week. If at all possible, we rest on the Lord's Day and enjoy the gifts of God's creation.

If we love our neighbors as ourselves, we are respectful to those especially closest to us, like our father and mother. Remembering that according to Jesus, everyone - even our enemies - are our neighbors, we are called not to kill, steal, or lie about them. We are called to refrain from envy about what others have, and we strive for faithfulness to a spouse we have pledged to love forever.

Basically, the greatest commandment is to live in God's love, and to make that love so much a part of us that we cannot help but reflect it. Do everything you can to surround your children with love; your own love and others' love. Keep them close to the church community so they can see that love lived out in community.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Have those family members who are old enough memorize the two great commandments from today's reading. Then get out the Bible and read the Ten Commandments in Exodus 20:1–17. Talk about them and see if family members can come up with a few more commandments that illustrate the two great ones.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Which of the Ten Commandments do you find most difficult to live out? How can you develop the virtue that corresponds to that particular commandment? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

Cedar Rapids Metro Task Force and Middle School Exploratory Study Committee

October 25, 2023

Dear Parishioners, School Families, and Community supporters,

This communication is being shared as an update to the important work of our schools and parishes as it relates to the Cedar Rapids metro task force recommendation of systemization and the Middle School exploratory study committee recommendation of consolidation. Over the course of the last few months, members of the local pastoral councils, finance councils, and school boards have engaged in dialogue and discernment related to the long term best interest of the Cedar Rapids metro Catholic schools. All of this hard work will result in a recommendation from each entity to their local pastor(s) for consideration.

In early November, the pastors will meet. Each pastor will bring forth their vote on systemization and if applicable, middle school consolidation, for group discussion. During the first meeting, all pastors will hear each other's votes which will create awareness of the votes throughout the greater Cedar Rapids Catholic community, in addition to opening the discussion to further questions and comments.

The work of the pastors will likely span over multiple meetings, ensuring that care and concern be given to the process, concerns, and possible adjustments. The goal is that consensus is achieved over the course of this discernment process. If there is pertinent information to share between meetings, an update will be provided at that time.

At the point a decision has been made, this will be shared with the greater Cedar Rapids Catholic community in a similar format to this communication. Until then, we ask for continued prayers for this process and the important work of our pastors for the greater Catholic community.
