


and needs have changed. Jackie has led us through with grace, laughter, and a few frustrations, but she has left us in a place ready to welcome our new Pantry Manager Robyn.

A Perfect Pairing - Haitians & Iowans: Agriculture for the Table By Steve and Peg Schmitz

This is the last weekend of our fall fundraiser to support our sister parish, Notre Dame de Lourdes. If you haven't already done so, please take home one of the photos hanging in the church ambulatory and pray for the students, teachers, doctors and farmers from our sister parish.

This is the third and final article in our "Perfect Pairing" series. The first two focused on our common values of education and medical care. **Another commonality is agriculture**, but there's a key difference between our Iowa parishes and our Haitian sister parish. Agriculture in Haiti is primarily a source of food rather than a source of income.

We have visited our sister parish 17 times in the past 23 years and our sister parish priests have visited us 6 times. During each visit, we worship with them, learn with them and share food with them. But a big difference in our visits to Haiti is that most of the food we share is grown locally, in small gardens and with no machinery. Their hard manual labor and timely rains make all the difference between food on the table and an empty stomach. Here, we pray for good weather and timely crops but to a great extent what we grow is not very closely linked to what appears on our tables.

You have made a big difference in the past several years by your generous support of the Take Away Hunger meal packaging events. Since 2011 you have packaged and sent over 287,000 meals to our sister parish. We continue to hold TAH packing events and we will ship those meals as soon as it is possible and safe to do so. The meals we send make a big difference in villages where the gardens fail due to drought or severe storms. We've also been able to provide seeds that allow farmers to replant after hurricanes. Once again it is likely that your kindness and generosity has saved lives. **God uses ordinary people to do the unexpected**.

We would love to have you join the Haiti committee. We need your talents to continue supporting our sister parish. Please pray for the people of Haiti as they labor to grow their food.

You Are Cordially Invited...



Welcome to the Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time. All of the readings this week focus on humility of self as a way to both honor God and to show love of neighbor. This is a great theme to ponder as we enter into the month of November and focus on the qualities of and need for stewardship.

Pope Francis expands our understanding of the tie between humility and service to God and to one another, "We disciples of Jesus must not seek titles of honour, of authority or supremacy. I tell you, it pains me personally to see people who, psychologically, live in pursuit of vain accolades. We disciples of Jesus must

not do this, because among ourselves there must be a simple and fraternal attitude. We are all brothers and sisters and in no way must we abuse others or look down on them. No. We are all brothers and sisters. If we have received talents from the heavenly Father, we must place them at the service of our brothers and sisters, and not exploit them for our own satisfaction and personal interests. We must not consider ourselves superior to others; modesty is essential for an existence that seeks to conform to the teaching of Jesus, who is meek and humble of heart and came not to be served but to serve."

This same connection is echoed in the introduction of the U.S. Bishops' Pastoral Letter on Stewardship: "Stewardship is an expression of discipleship, with the power to change how we understand and live out our lives. Disciples who practice stewardship recognize God as the origin of life, the giver of freedom, the source of all they have and are and will be. They are deeply aware of the truth that "The Lord's are the earth and its fullness; the world and those who dwell in it" (Ps 24:1). They know themselves to be recipients and caretakers of God's many gifts. They are grateful for what they have received and eager to cultivate their gifts out of love for God and one another."

One way to better understand this is to picture a rock skipping on top of water. The rock is an individual element and remains an individual throughout its journey, but it creates waves every time it touches the water and those waves intersect as they ebb and flow. The same is true with the Eucharist. Its beginning was a singular event in time, but as we remember it each time at Mass, it touches us, which in turn allows us to share its grace and nourishment with others. How do we do this? Simply by sharing our time, talent and treasures.

Our current culture would have us believe that time is in short supply. Not so. Many of us are very busy with many activities, like Martha. Have we looked at our schedules through the lens of stewardship? If we did, we might realize that some of those activities feed not our brothers and sisters, but only our own ego. God has graced all of us with talents - how are we using those? Do we use them to receive accolades and build our own financial silos or do we quietly share those talents to make life more equitable for our community and our world? How are we using our financial gifts? There is a song by Christian artist, Matthew West called Do Something. The lyrics sum up our call to stewardship, to share our blessings of time, talent and financial treasure with each other:

I woke up this morning
Saw a world full of trouble now
Thought, how'd we ever get so far down
How's it ever gonna turn around
So I turned my eyes to Heaven
I thought, "God, why don't You do something?"

Well, I just couldn't bear the thought of People living in poverty Children sold into slavery The thought disgusted me So, I shook my fist at Heaven Said, "God, why don't You do something?" He said, "I did, I created you"
If not us, then who
If not me and you
Right now, it's time for us to do something
If not now, then when
Will we see an end

To all this pain
It's not enough to do nothing
It's time for us to do something
I'm so tired of talking
About how we are God's hands and feet
But it's easier to say than to be
Live like angels of apathy who tell ourselves

It's alright, "somebody else will do something" Well, I don't know about you

But I'm sick and tired of life with no desire I don't want a flame. I want a fire

I wanna be the one who stands up and says,

"I'm gonna do something"
We are the salt of the earth
We are a city on a hill

But we're never gonna change the world

By standing still No we won't stand still No we won't stand still No we won't stand still

And so, I invite you to Mass (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent or who is seeking God to come into their life, invite them to join you! If you have been absent for a while, come back - we need you and love you. *Love God - Serve Others - Form Disciples*. Praying and hoping with you always.

True Humility

Humility Jesus tells his followers they are to respect the law, but not to follow the example of the Scribes and Pharisees. Jesus accuses both groups of not practicing what they preach, of putting huge burdens on the people and of always wanting to sit in the places of honor

To be humble is simply to be honest about our gifts and accomplishments. It doesn't mean running yourself down any more than it means talking yourself up. Humility is saying "thank you" when someone compliments you on your achievement. Hanging your head and telling them Betty Jo is so much better is really false humility. Humility acknowledges your strong points as well as your weak ones.

Teach your children humility by taking care when you compliment them. Affirmation and congratulations are important to everyone, and most especially to youngsters. But hearing, "Great work!" for everything they do soon loses any meaning. Decide on your degrees of superlatives (good going, great work, excellent job, for example) and try to use them as consistently as possible.

Help your child develop an internal sense of accomplishment by letting her evaluate her own work. Try using a scale of one to five, or if she is little, a sad face to a big smiley face. Let your child know you like her work and then ask her how she likes it. Make sure at least one piece of work has a smiley face on it.

If at all possible find some time for yourself to do something creative: knitting, scrapbooking, painting, writing, learning how to play an instrument, gardening or interior designing. You were given certain gifts and talents—acknowledge them, develop them and thank God for them. That's true humility.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask each family member what one talent they would like to have. How can they go about getting it?

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Take some time for silent prayer and then in honest humility, write down your good qualities.

On the first Sunday of October, we finished our series on the Holy Trinity. In this session, we explored God the Holy Spirit. We learned about some of the attributes of the Holy Spirit such as energizing, empowering, creative, and collaborative.

The second Sunday of the month was devoted to community building. We made personal pizzas, enjoyed icebreakers, and spent some time playing volleyball and kickball outside!

On our third Sunday of October, students took part in a service opportunity. Together, Ablaze made a meal for the Catholic Worker House. Before starting our project, we discussed the basics of Catholic Social Teaching, church teaching comprised of writings from Popes and other Catholic leaders that help us answer the question: "What would Jesus do?"

Students also learned about Dorothy Day, a powerhouse Catholic who founded the Catholic Worker House movement in the 1930's, which feeds and houses people still today. It is important for us to know the "why" before we do something. Our why, when connected to our faith, becomes a stronger why. Learning about Catholic Social Teaching and people who actively express that through their life can help us understand our why and give us an example to follow.

Students worked together to make lasagna and cake. Lemonade and frozen vegetables were also donated for the meal. Some students made cards and coloring books for the young children at the Catholic Worker House.
