

Welcome to the last Sunday of our liturgical year. Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

The Gospel reading is the culmination of the great judgment at the end of times that Jesus has relayed through the 3 parables in Matthew 25. And all of it boils down to one question, "How have you loved, cared for and shown mercy to others?"

Loving others can be challenging. We are wonderfully unique individuals created by God. And since God created us to be social beings who are interdependent on one another, no one person has it "all." That means we need to work together which can result in friction. But if we love, care for and show mercy to our brothers and sisters, there should be few conflicts that cannot be resolved.

We have become very independent and self-sufficient in our current world. Many look down upon those who are struggling in life and feel little to no empathy. Several of the saints provide the example of how we should care for our brothers and sisters: St. Elizabeth Ann Seton founded several schools for the needy; St. Marianne Cope took care of the lepers in Hawaii; St. Katharine Drexel founded schools and served as a missionary with the Native Americans and African Americans; St. Frances Xavier Cabrini founded institutions for the poor, the abandoned, the uneducated and the sick; and the list would not be complete without Mother Teresa of Calcutta. The All Saints Social Justice Committee and our Haiti Committee lead our efforts of caring for the least in our own community and in the greater world. We are grateful for their leadership and we are blessed that many parishioners are very willing to share financial gifts that we direct to provide food and drink to the hungry, clothe the naked and visit the ill and those in prison. Thank you!

The Lord is our shepherd. When we know Him as the king of our universe, there is nothing that we shall want. But...do we know Jesus to be king of our universe? Do we make the weekend liturgy and Holy Days of Obligation a priority in our busy lives or do we fit God in when it is convenient? Do we share the abundance that we receive from the Lord with our brothers and sisters or do we save up our human wealth in personal silos? Do we multiply and share God's mercy with others or are we stringent with our heart and love by not forgiving others? Today's Gospel parable serves as a great examination of conscience that we could do at the end of every day. As we enter into the Season of Advent, let's focus on loving others, caring for others and showing mercy to others. In so doing, the bright star of Bethlehem will shine in our own lives showing Jesus the crib that we have prepared for him in our hearts.

And so, I invite you to Mass (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent or who is seeking God to come into their life, invite them to join you! If you have been absent for a while, come back - we need you and love you. *Love God - Serve Others - Form Disciples*. Praying and hoping with you always.



November 26, 2023 • Our Lord Jesus Christ the King • Matthew 25:31-46

Celebrate the Family

Throughout the Gospels we hear about what Jesus does to bring about the kingdom. In this parable, we hear what we need to do to be a part of the kingdom. In this story of Christ's kingship, we hear about the corporal works of mercy—feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, and so on.

Isn't it good to know that by providing for our children's physical, emotional, and spiritual welfare we find ourselves blessed by Jesus, seated on the right side of God?

Parents are no strangers to the corporal works of mercy. Every day we feed the hungry and give drink to the thirsty (think of all those school lunches packed!) We clothe the naked (or at least pay for the clothes of those born naked). We take care of the sick and visit the imprisoned. (Think about the bars on a crib or a heartbroken teen self-imprisoned in her room.)

If we consider the spiritual works of mercy—instruct the ignorant, counsel the doubtful, admonish sinners, forgive offenses, bear wrongs patiently, comfort the afflicted and pray for the living and the dead—we will discover seven more everyday opportunities for parents to be blessed.

We listen patiently to a little one as she sounds out the words in her primer. With every first-dayof-school pep talk we counsel the doubtful. We admonish the sinner when we provide Christian commentary during almost any sitcom or news report. It's a spiritual work of mercy when we let a penitent teenager off lightly for mouthing off. And it's an opportunity to bear wrongs patiently when an "I'm sorry" from the offender isn't forthcoming. Parents comfort babies suffering from colic and adolescents afflicted with acne.

Sometimes we think in order to be a saint we have to have visions or die as a missionary. But if we listen to this Gospel reading, it is fairly clear that the path to heaven runs right through our kitchen and family room.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Plan a special meal for no particular reason except to celebrate being a family. Let everyone have a part in the preparations, decorations, and clean-up.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

List all the good things in your life. List all the good things about yourself. Ponder your goodness and blessings. What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?
