From The Desk of Executive Director Kate Getty:

It is hard to believe that 2023 is coming to a close shortly and we are celebrating Christ's birth in a few days. I have always loved this season of giving and loving our community.

I will be honest, this year has been harder than I can remember past years. We are so very busy. I am thrilled we are here to help the folks in our community, but it can be a lot of work for our volunteers as we strive to meet their needs.

From July through the end of November, 11,085 people needed our pantry. In addition, 2,298 bags of food have been handed out to those living without access to a kitchen. While all our parishes donate food, as do many individual parishioners and community members, MCO has also spent \$42,021.06 purchasing food since July 1.

We are blessed by our Catholic schools who participate in Reverse Advent programs where students bring items to school and then the food is brought here to MCO. That makes a big impact in filling our shelves. We had the "Called To Be Saints" class from Xavier volunteering here weekly all semester, and each of those students impressed us with their time, talents, and enthusiasm. I love seeing some of their gifts at work.

We are all blessed by this season of giving that surrounds Christmas. I hope all of you are blessed abundantly through the Advent season and all of 2024!

"Abundance Beyond Measure"



The theme of this year's stewardship campaign resonates with a spiritual resonance: "Abundance Beyond Measure."

Drawing inspiration from the biblical narrative of Jesus miraculously feeding 5,000 souls, we perceive the profound symbolism within this event. Some view it as a multiplication of five loaves and two fish, while others see it as a manifestation of compassion.

Fourth Sunday of Advent: An Advent Journey



This time of year, we hear again about the journey of Mary and Joseph from Nazareth to Bethlehem. The journey was ordered by the Roman government to enable a census to be taken.

The start of their journey would have been Mary's parents' home in Nazareth, today the site of the Church of the Annunciation. The church was built on top of Mary's home where the angel Gabriel proclaimed that she would be the Mother of the Savior. The home was small in comparison to the

homes we live in here, nothing more than a dark cave. In contrast the church above is large and spacious and filled with light and beautiful art depictions of Mary donated by countries across the globe. It makes me think of the homes of our friends in Haiti made of stone or sticks and canvas, small and dark.

From that small place Mary and Joseph started their journey. It could not have been a convenient time for a woman who was 9 months pregnant to be traveling 90 miles. In addition, it was not an easy journey. I didn't appreciate how difficult the journey was until I took the same journey. The land scape was stark and barren and hilly. I was in an air-conditioned bus on a paved road and my journey took a little less than 2 hours. The journey for Mary and Joseph was quite different. They traveled on a road that was nothing more than an unpaved path and they were on foot with a donkey. They would likely have been able to cover only 20 miles in a day so a 90-mile journey would have taken the best part of 5 days. The roads were far from safe at the time of their journey, many of roads were populated by men willing to take food or money from travelers. I think of our many friends in Haiti who regularly face similar challenges in traveling the roads in their beautiful country.

Mary and Joseph arrived in a town that was overflowing with people and could not find a safe place to stay. They did find a shepherd's cave that they shared with animals. The site of the birth now has the Church of the Nativity built above the cave. The Church is small but spacious and open, in contrast to the cave is very small and dark. Not a comfortable or safe space for a child to be born and yet Mary gave birth with just Joseph and the animals with her. I think of our friends in Haiti who also give birth alone or with 1 or 2 people with them.

I learned to see Mary and Joseph's journey differently because I visited the Holy Land, but I think I can see their journey in some of my life experiences. We all have times when we are experiencing hardship as we attempt to accomplish a goal. Some of our hardships are created by others and some are self-inflicted. I think Mary and Joseph's story can guide us in being persistent and to look for the joy that is in the ordinary of life.

You Are Cordially Invited...



Welcome to the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Today we light the fourth and final candle in our Advent wreath. The Gospel readings to this point have focused on John the Baptist and his message of repentance and returning to the Lord. His message was received by many, who took a step toward their homecoming with God through the waters of baptism. The time between the fourth Sunday of Advent and Christmas is the shortest it can be. We attend Mass on Saturday or Sunday for the last of our Advent waiting and reflecting only to return a few short hours later to celebrate the birth of Christ.

Today we look at Luke's account of the announcement of the birth of Jesus. In other liturgical years, we hear the invitation by the angel Gabriel from the viewpoint of Matthew. While there are several similarities between the infancy narrative accounts found in Matthew and Luke, there are, also, some differences. Why the differences and does this mean anything? While the books of the Bible contain some historical facts, it should not be read as a history book. The inspired words of the Bible should be read and reflected upon against the backdrop of our own lives (past, present and future) in order to see God's unique light in our current situation.

There are various literary styles used in the Bible all reflecting the inspiration of God married with the time and culture of the author. Margaret Nutting Ralph in her book And God Said What? helps the reader sort through and interpret these various literary styles in the Bible. Looking at Bible passages through the literary lens meant to help us connect the past to the present is known as midrash. This was a teaching technique that was familiar to the culture of Jesus' time and "played an important role in Judaism after the Babylonian exile...Midrash had much the same function in postexilic Judaism that a good homily or sermon has in our lives. The question that the scribe, homilist or preacher is trying to address is not 'what is the original meaning of the text?' but, rather 'How does this text, God's living word, help us understand the meaning of our present situation?'"

The infancy narratives were included in these two Gospel accounts to help the audience understand why the birth of Jesus was so important. This significance is found not just in his birth, but in the whole of his life, death and most importantly, his resurrection. The joy and hope found in the birth of Christ is as applicable to us today as it was to the audience of the early Church. We wait, we celebrate, we hope for the birth of Jesus all with the knowledge that we must also suffer, we must die and only by the sacrifice won by the resurrection of Jesus are we reunited with God in salvation. But none of this would be without the birth of our Savior. Pope Francis reminds us that through the birth of Christ, "not only is God is making provision for the salvation of His people, but also that He has a plan for each individual person when we allow ourselves to know His unconditional love and follow His guiding commandments. In many cases, our work for God seems rather ordinary, but each ordinary task which we carry out fits into God's plan in ways that we cannot yet understand. God desires not the skill of our hands and talents alone, but the love of our hearts. The Babe in the Manger reminds us of what God has done and is still doing for us. What are we doing in return? Let us show our gratitude to God by living as true followers of Christ: "Behold, here I am Lord, your humble and grateful servant. Let it be done to me according to Your word." With renewed vigor, let us proclaim in these last days of Advent, Jesus is coming, Jesus is coming!

I invite all of us to read both of the infancy narratives today as we wait in the few short hours between the last of Advent and the beginning of the celebration of Christmas. Connect the similarities and discern the differences. Does one speak to you today more than the other? What do your hear God saying through these ancient, but living words and how do they invite you to reflect upon and adjust your current life? Through this time of prayer, I hope that we are all able to attend Christmas Mass with a renewed connection to God that brings us peace and joy.

And so, I invite you to attend Mass this weekend (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent, invite them to join you! Rejoice! Rejoice! Come, Lord Jesus! Praying with you always.



The Lord is With You

The Gospel of the Annunciation tells us the story of an angel inviting Mary to become the mother of the Messiah. She asks how this is possible since she is unmarried and has never been intimate with a man. She is told that the Holy Spirit will come upon her, and she will conceive a son. With great faith, Mary says yes to this mystery.

Our children are growing up in a world filled with fear and uncertainty. They need the virtues of faith, hope and love more than ever. They need faith in a God who will always be there for them, and they need to trust that whatever they require will be provided. If we hope to help them grow in this faith we have to make sure they feel anchored in our love, and God's love.

Mary, Jesus' mother, is the perfect model for every parent. Imagine how strong Mary's faith must have been to say yes to God's request. She was a young girl, probably in her early teens. She was unmarried and knew the harsh consequences of being unwed and pregnant. But still she said yes, trusting that whatever she needed would be provided.

Mary was open to God's Spirit and allowed the Spirit to work in her and through her. She said yes, and taught her son to say yes. All through her life she modeled for her son the virtues of faith, hope and love. She taught him his prayers, and told him the stories of their faith. She anchored him in her love, and encouraged him in his mission.

Like Mary, we too are invited to model for our children the faith, hope and love the Spirit is eager to share with us. When Mary said yes and allowed the Spirit to work within her, the world changed forever. We too are invited to live in God's spirit and teach our children to say yes to the Spirit's gifts so that, like Mary, we can be Christbearers to the world around us.
