

You Are Cordially Invited...

Welcome to the Second Sunday of Easter. Today we are treated to two bookends that invite us to ponder the renewed life that Jesus won for us in his death and Resurrection.

Let's start with the Gospel reading of John and set the stage for our reflection today. We

pick up our narrative on "the evening of that first day of the week" also known as Sunday night. The disciples were understandably very scared. Their teacher/rabbi had just been arrested, beaten, tortured and crucified on a cross. Following John's Gospel account, Simon Peter and John ran to the tomb after Mary Magdala alerted them that the stone had been removed from the tomb. Simon Peter and John did not encounter the Risen Jesus at the tomb, but Mary did as she stayed after they had left. Recall that John's Gospel states that Peter and John "believed" at the sight of the burial cloths and that Mary, after speaking with and recognizing Jesus, ran back to the disciples and announced, "I have seen the Lord." We do not know what happened between the events of the morning and where we pick up which is now evening of that day. We can assume that whatever Peter, John and Mary have told the group was not enough to dispel the fear they had of the Jews and the

likelihood of Jesus' fate or something similar happening to them. We can also infer, based on the locked door, that the streets were still not a safe place for the early Christians to be seen. Enter the Risen Jesus. And even though the disciples "rejoiced when they saw the Lord," and he breathed the Holy Spirit upon them and sent them forth - where are they a week later? Still locked and hidden in the same room.

Let's contrast this picture of the disciples to the portrayal of the disciples in the Acts of the Apostle reading for today. They are now "meeting together in the temple area" and "breaking bread" in each others' homes. Now some of the wording could initially lead us to believe that they were living and teaching within an inclusive community: "communal life" and "all who believed were together and had all things in common." But the last sentence dispels that notion, "And every day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved." One cannot grow a closed community except through subversive means and there is absolutely no indication that this happened. Rather, it was the power of the teaching that was then fully lived in the communal life that led to the conversion of many who were witnesses.

So how did the disciples transform from a terrified group hiding in a locked room to an ever expanding group who gave both verbal and physical credence to the teachings of Jesus? In his book, The Great Mysteries, Andrew Greeley posits that understanding our lives and the life of the world can be like the mystery of the cross and resurrection. "We experience death and rebirth often in our own lives... in fact, we discover with time and experience that progress and growth in the human condition - whether it be personal or social - is always accomplished through a series of death and rebirths. In the psychotherapeutic experience in particular, we learn that we can only rise to the new human - the more free, more open, more confident, more authentic self - by dying to the old person, that narrow, anxious, fearful, defense-ridden self. We become more human and society becomes more just only through death and resurrection." (continued next page...)

Help Raise \$ for our School... EASILY!



Many of our families and parishioners already know but for those that may not, YOU can help raise money for All Saints School easily by simply giving us your receipts from Hy-Vee! Volunteers with the school will process your receipts. Upon completion of the current fundraising year, Hy-Vee will donate \$1 for every \$200

in qualifying receipts! Receipt items that do NOT qualify for donations include: Alcohol products, tobacco products, money orders and money order fees, check cashing fees, returned check service fees, lottery, postal services, utility bill pay services, amusement or entertainment tickets, dry cleaning, photo copies, or items prohibited by law. If you purchase any of the aforementioned products, please note that your receipts will still be accepted if they also contain qualifying products.



Please Note Schools can also raise money by partnering with the Box Tops for Education program. There have been significant changes made to how the program works. In years past, participants would clip the Box Tops for Education logo from actual food packages and drop them off

at the school. Due to changes in technology, this is no longer the case. To ensure that your credit for Box Tops goes to All Saints School, you simply use your mobile device to scan your store receipt (featuring participating products) and send those images using the app available at http://BTFE.com within 14 days after your purchase. The clipped Box Tops themselves are no longer accepted. Products need not be purchased only at Hy-Vee stores. Products that qualify for this program can be purchased at any chain store. Please note that we no longer accept Campbell's Soup Labels. Sadly, this program was ended in January, 2018.

Focusing on Forgiveness

On the evening of the Resurrection, the disciples locked themselves in the house in which they were staying. Jesus came and stood among them. He offers them peace, and tells them that he is sending them out just as his Father had sent him. He breathes on them and tells them to receive the Spirit.

It is true. All we have to do is confess our sins, be truly sorry, and our sins are forgiven. This is true, of course, as long as we understand what being truly sorry means. There are more than words involved. Consider these three elements.

First, we say we are sorry. Our God is a God of love who calls all things to wholeness and harmony. When we act against love, we act against God, and we need to say the words that express our sorrow.

Second, we focus on change. If we say we are sorry and have no intention of changing our behavior, we can't be forgiven. Even God cannot free us from sin if we insist on holding onto it. Sometimes we are really sorry for our actions but can't muster the courage to change. In that case, we need to ask God for the desire to change. Even this small inclination to mend our ways is enough to loosen sin's grip and allow the Holy Spirit to slip in.

Third, we admit we are human. We humbly acknowledge that we need the Spirit's help to love the way God wants us to love. We face our limitations and our powerlessness and allow the Spirit's strength to fill us. We trust that, with God's help, we can overcome the most compelling sins or bad habits and become the person God calls us to be.

Teach your children what it means to say "I am sorry," and help them understand the three essential elements of forgiveness. Explain each element. Make sure they know the importance of asking for God's help to be strong throughout their day. And when they are not ready to forgive or to give up their anger, teach them to ask for God's help to let go.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Adult family members may want to practice simple Act of Contrition themselves, and then pray it together with their children as part of their bedtime prayers.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What bad habit, inclination, or attitude do you find difficult to break? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?
