

You Are Cordially Invited...



Welcome to the Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The message from today's Gospel reading is a challenging one. It talks about the cost of discipleship. To make His point, Jesus emphasized what it would take in His words, "...and whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me is not worthy of me." Okay, so in today's world, we might have to bear some hardships and unpleasantness in life - we can do that, right? But those are not the watered-down images that Jesus wanted his apostles (and us) to understand about the journey we are called to when we truly know and accept our baptismal call to

be a disciple here on earth. Curtis Mitch and Edward Sri direct our imaginations toward the greater reality of the time of Jesus as they explain in The Gospel of Matthew, "The idea of taking up a cross is often used by Christians today as a metaphor to describe bearing with life's regular burdens: a long wait in traffic, a difficult boss, a cold. However, for the first-century Jews, the image of taking up a cross evoked horror and shame. Crucifixion was the cruelest form of execution used by the Roman government. It was intended not only to punish rebels by inflicting as much physical pain as possible but also to maximize humiliation, sending a signal to other potential rebels not to revolt against Rome. The criminal's public shaming began when he took up his crossbeam and carried it though the city streets amid the mockery of the crowds. Therefore when Jesus says the true disciple must 'take up his cross' he is not merely calling for acceptance of life's little inconveniences and hardships. He is calling his disciples to be willing to give up everything, even their lives, if necessary, to follow him," (Insert long pause) Well. Wow. That puts a whole new light on discipleship. And Jesus talks about this more than once. If we take the time to read the Gospel accounts and connect the dots, Jesus actually talks quite a bit about the cost of following Him. Recall that last week, we reflected on his words, "Can you drink the cup?" Do we truly understand that discipleship is more than just mouthing the words?

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a Protestant theologian who was executed by the Nazis, had this to say about discipleship and God's grace in his book The Cost of Discipleship: "Cheap grace is the deadly enemy of our Church. We are fighting today for costly grace. Cheap grace means grace sold on the market like cheapjacks' wares. The sacraments, the forgiveness of sin, and the consolations of religion are thrown away at cut prices...Grace without price, grace without cost. The essence of grace, we suppose, is that the account has been paid in advance; and because it has been paid, everything can be had for nothing." He continues, "Grace is costly because it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs a [person] their life, and it is grace because it gives a [person] the only true life."

Do we truly understand that we own nothing and that everything we have is due to God's grace? Grace is not a carrot and stick either. We don't earn grace, it was already won for us when God sacrificed His Son, Jesus Christ, for us. Costly grace. God awaits our response everyday. We need willing disciples at home, at work, in our community and in our world to share Jesus' love and God's message of salvation. There may be times that we will be ridiculed for our Christian actions and our words. Are we willing to follow-through anyway? There may be times when our own family members no longer wish to associate with us due to our Christian actions and words. Are we willing to follow-through anyway? And like many martyrs and saints throughout the world, we may be put to death for our Christian actions and words. Are we willing to follow-through anyway?

Costly grace. As with most things in life, starting small can be the best springboard into a new way of life. At All Saints there are many areas that would benefit from the grace of volunteers. We all have gifts and talents - how can we use them to invite more people in to hear the Word of God? Smiling faces at the door to welcome all, someone to pull weeds so the property looks attractive, people willing to share their story to give others the courage to take the next step in their faith life, someone to give that struggling parent a comforting word after Mass rather than a judgmental look, people willing to help with the liturgical ministries, etc. Our individual gifts and talents shine best and are actually multiplied when we use them as a community of believers. Bread, broken and shared!

And so, I invite you to Mass (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent or who is seeking God to come into their life, invite them to join you! Love God-Serve Others-Form Disciples.

Take Up Your Cross

Jesus continues to prepare the apostles to go out into the world. He tells them that his message of peace may sometimes provoke people. He tells them again that they will have to face suffering.

We try to shelter our children from harm. But eventually there comes a day when we realize we can no longer protect them from an imperfect world. They have to deal with illness, a pet dying, or friends talking about them behind their backs. Crosses are a part of the human condition. Jesus asks us to accept our crosses and instead of feeling sorry for ourselves to pick them up and somehow be graced through them.

Jesus was fully human, as human as we are, and he accepted his humanity. I think that is what Jesus asks of us, to simply accept the fact that we are human with all the limitations and restrictions that being human brings with it. We fall down and we get hurt. Friends and family disappoint us and sometimes even abandon us. Life is difficult, and no one can escape its crosses. Not even Jesus.

We can work hard to change the things we do not like, but inevitably we cannot control our lives. When we accept this fact in our heart of hearts, we can surrender control and begin to experience the peace of Christ's divinity. We can walk through the bitter haze of any physical or emotional pain because we share in Christ's strength and courage. We have his divine light to shine in all the dark corners.

Teach your children how to accept their disappointments and crosses by carrying your own crosses with grace. Help them to figure out what pain can be legitimately avoided and what pain just has to be suffered through. Allow them to face the consequences of their actions. And when they are old enough, pray with them the Serenity Prayer, "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change; courage to change the things I can; and the wisdom to know the difference. Amen."

FAMILY RESPONSE

Talk about how everyone has crosses in life, some are big and some are small. Ask everyone to share a cross they carried last week. End with the Serenity Prayer.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What are some of the crosses in your life right now? Which ones can you let go or find a way around? Which ones do you need to just pick up and carry? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?
