

You Are Cordially Invited...



Welcome to the Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. It hasn't been that long ago that the sun warmed our Iowa soil to the point that no frost remained and it was safe to plant some seeds. I didn't think of it at the time, but after reading today's Gospel, I am reminded of how small some of those seeds are. It is now nearing the end of July, and those tiny seeds have become medium to large sized plants starting to bear fruits and vegetables. Jesus likens the tiny mustard seed to the kingdom of heaven. When we pray to God with the prayer that Jesus taught, we ask for

God's grace in making the kingdom of heaven visible and a reality here on Earth, too.

The COVID pandemic was destructive in many ways: it took lives; jobs; connections with others; and affected the mental health and faith life of many. We weren't even able to gather and worship together for awhile. When that restriction was lifted, many parishioners did not come back. The leadership councils, pastor and staff have planted several mustard seeds to welcome our parishioners back to faithful attendance at the weekend liturgy but the return journey has been a slow process. Many use the language of normalcy to describe the time prior to COVID and that to which we would like to return. But, do we wish for all things to return to "normal?" Let's be honest, there were some things in our lives (personal, work, family and faith) that weren't working and helping us to be the best-version-of-ourselves prior to COVID. The same can be said for life at All Saints. There were many great opportunities and people, but we weren't always allowing ourselves to be guided by our mission statement: *Love God - Serve Others - Form Disciples*. If we didn't all readily return to the weekend liturgy once COVID restrictions were lifted, then perhaps we need to consider the possibility that our efforts could be focused on conditioning the "soil" of our parish in conjunction with planting more seeds. In last week's Gospel, Jesus shared a parable with the disciples and crowd about just this. I do not think it is any coincidence that Jesus shared parables that link both the seed and the soil. Both are needed for optimal growth and bearing great fruit.

This Fall, the leadership bodies and the staff will be sharing the results of the Parish Vitality Study that was conducted earlier this year and the results of the listening sessions guided by our Faith Formation staff. We cannot become a vibrant parish without each and every one of our parishioners. We have been given eyes to see and ears to hear, but we don't all see and hear the same. We need everyone's help to identify the areas where we have rocks, thin soil and weeds in our efforts. The Son of Man has sown the good seed in the children of the kingdom. Through our time and efforts in Loving God - Serving Others - Forming Disciples, that seed will grow and the Kingdom of Heaven will be a reality here on Earth, also.

And so, I invite you to Mass (and then the next and the next...) If you know someone who has been absent or who is seeking God to come into their life, invite them to join you! I invite you to share what your eyes are seeing and your ears are hearing in your faith life. Let's work on helping God to plant seeds along with nourishing ourselves and others by removing the rocks, pulling the weeds and conditioning the soil. Praying and hoping with you always.

DEAR TOMIC PEOPLE...



During my time in Italy, I experienced some of the most famous churches in the world, known for their beauty, complexity, and artistic genius. The inventiveness of Byzantine mosaics, the imaginative murals mirroring the life of St. Francis, and of course, the magnificence of St. Peter's Basilica surrounded me daily. However, there is a crucial element to all these churches that is not often seen with the eyes, but rather the heart. It takes our Eucharistic mentality to see what all this fuss is truly pointing to.

Chiesa Parrocchiale del Santo Volto di Gesù translated to The Holy Face of Jesus Parish directs us to this often unseen element. She finds herself in Rome, Italy, nestled between various apartment buildings, parks, and trails. Constructed in 2003, she is a modern church, but her message is as old as the Church itself. There are many things to note about this church. For one, if you look closely at the large window formation behind the altar, it looks like an eye, the lights on the ceiling add an eyelash effect, and the curvature of the nave emphasizes that this church is looking at something.

The pews are long benches with two rectangular stones for each place, one for the seat, and one for the backrest. There are no side arms or detailed carvings, just white, stone slabs. In straight lines, they coexist uniformly next to one another. My entire class sat in these chair-pew hybrids. Looking out, I was immediately struck with color. Red, blue, purple, beige, sunshine yellow, and sage green poured into my pupils like cans of paint splattering on the canvas of my retinas; on the canvas of the church. The most real thing about our Church is our people. This is what the gold and the marble and the billions of trillions of dollars are all about.

However, this former way of communicating this Trinitarian truth of community has been lost through the centuries. Sadly, for a laundry list of reasons, some more obvious than others, many people, more specifically many young people, do not believe the Church values them more than the stained glass and the giant pillars.

According to the Archdiocese of Dubuque, it is estimated that about 60% of Catholic Teens feel disenfranchised or reluctant about the Catholic faith. The Archdiocese believes that what these students need most is to know that people in their church care about them and make them feel like they belong. The description is a lack of connection. The prescription is Relational Ministry.

Relational Ministry focuses on connecting with the heart of the child. It is being present when they arrive at church and being active in their lives outside of the church. Relational Ministry often entails talking about life through a lens of faith rather than only talking about faith explicitly. It frequently involves sharing a meal, playing games, being silly, and praying with and for one another. This may translate to a fluffy, watered-down approach, however, was it not our own Savior that broke bread with those around him and shared in conversation and communion? Relational Ministry, when done right, is synonymous with Christ's ministry. Because we are all called to share in Christ's mission as disciples, each of us, regardless of how involved we are with the youth in our parish, has a duty to incorporate young parishioners into the Church. What does this look like? What do the youth of our Church need from **you**?

It may mean getting to know young people, perhaps chatting with them after mass and welcoming them with a smile. Be welcoming and inclusive.

Being the Mustard Seed

Jesus continues to talk to the people in parables. He uses everyday things to help them remember the point of his teaching. He tells the crowd that the kingdom of God is like a tiny mustard seed that grows into a huge bush that can serve as a nesting place for the birds in the sky.

When I think about that tiny mustard seed and the kingdom of God, I think about the rippling effect one small act of kindness can have. When a person offers a smile or a simple courtesy, it can sometimes change the course of another's day.

I am not a morning person, and with very little effort I have managed to raise a whole family of morning grumps. I remember the days when all seven of us were playing "beat the clock" at 6:30 AM. At best, our "good mornings" were grumbled as we tried to keep out of each other's way. Some mornings our house felt like the proverbial powder keg, just one missing sock away from disaster. On those mornings, one person's outburst over an empty milk carton could sour everyone's day.

I developed my mustard seed theory by watching how that powder keg could be defused—a shared cinnamon bun, some help searching for missing keys, or a ride offered to school. One person's act of kindness could affect everyone. Since I am not my best at daybreak, it took a conscious effort for me to be that person.

I discovered that when I started the day with prayer I could often find a quiet peace inside myself that helped me respond rather than react. It was wonderful to watch how sometimes that mustard seed experience of peace could even grow to fill a household. I picture the kingdom of God as an eternal experience of that peace—an experience we can sometimes taste even on grumpy mornings.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask family members to share what gets them out of grumpy moods. How can they get themselves out of a bad mood?

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What are some of the things that set you up to be grumpy? How can you avoid them or work around them? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?
