

Everyday Metanoia



Today's Gospel reading from Mark can be viewed through two different lenses: that of the people and that of Jesus. Looking at it from the viewpoint of the people reminds me a lot of high school reunions. Many look forward to these gatherings for it is a chance to catch up and relive moments of happiness experienced with high school friends. I have to admit from the start that my opinion of these occasions is definitely colored by the fact that I was a huge nerd in high school and that I was 1 of 565 in my graduating class. Multiply that by 3 grade levels and one can easily understand that unless a student is involved in some kind of afterschool activity like sports, music or theater, it's almost impossible to find

and create a group of like-minded individuals in that big of a crowd. My family did not have extra money and I was determined to attend a private college, so that meant no extracurricular activities for me as my goal was to achieve great grades so I could pay for private college through scholarships. The only reason that anyone who was in the "cool" group even acknowledged my presence in high school was because I was very good at my studies and they wanted help or for me to do the homework. I was thrilled when graduation rolled around so that I could kiss that experience goodbye. Over the course of the years, I have let myself be talked into attending two of the reunions. The reaction of the people in today's Gospel reading mirrors the reaction I witnessed as the "in" crowd and the "out" crowd mixed and got to know each other as adults. Both the people of Jesus' home town and my classmates were astonished at the changes witnessed in someone they had grown up with. The system that we used in high school to judge one another was no longer valid. Pope Francis spoke to this issue with some youth recently: "Nowadays, we risk forgetting who we are, becoming obsessed with appearances, bombarded with messages that make life depend on what we wear, the car we drive, how others see us... Yet those ancient words – know thyself – remain valid today. Realize that your worth is in who you are and not what you have. Your worth is not in the brand of the dress or shoes you wear, but because you are unique." I have to give my high school classmates credit as most were very warm and welcoming once the initial shock wore off; Jesus was not so fortunate.

Looking at this Gospel passage through the lens of Jesus, I can imagine that he experienced a human mixture of anticipation and nervousness as he walked toward his home town. On the one hand, he may not have seen some of his relatives and neighbors for some time and was joyous at being able to see them again. On the other hand, he may have been anxious at how they would receive him. The mother's heart in me breaks for the disappointment that Jesus experienced. In today's world, as the Son of God, Jesus had won the largest jackpot ever possible in the lottery or powerball drawing. He naturally wanted to share his gift with those whom he knew best: family and friends. But they couldn't move past his poor and humble upbringing and did not treat him well - "And they took offense at him."

We know and honor Jesus as the Son of God, but unless we allow ourselves to know and honor him as the Son of Man, too, we limit our own capacity of faith. Pope Francis says, "According to the people of Nazareth, God is too great to humble himself to speak through such a simple man! It is the scandal of the Incarnation: the unsettling event of a God made flesh who thinks with the mind of a man, works and acts with the hands of a man, loves with a human heart, a God who struggles, eats and sleeps like one of us. The Son of God overturns every human framework: it is not the disciples who washed the feet of the Lord, but it is the Lord who washed the feet of the disciples. This is a reason for scandal and incredulity, not only in that period, but in all ages, even today."

We may think that we are bothering God or that He couldn't possibly know our understand our troubles. But that is exactly what God accomplished through the birth, death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ. In the most sacrificial gift of love possible, God entered our human world to know and love us even more than He already did. God graces us daily, but those mustard seeds cannot reach full potential without fully trusting and giving all of ourselves to God. That means taking the human things like the squabble with our spouse to God; our frustrations with work to God; and our everyday worries to God. If we believe that God is too "big" for these, we miss being amazed at the miracles that can happen even with the most mundane.

Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Come and grow your faith with the All Saints Parish community! Prepare to be amazed!

A Prophet-Except In Your Own Home

Jesus returns home to preach in the synagogue in which he grew up. The people were astonished at his wisdom. Word had already reached them concerning all of the miracles he had accomplished. But rather than rejoicing in his homecoming, they took offense.

This Gospel speaks to just about every parent of an adolescent who ever lived. In Jesus' words, "Prophets are not without honor, except...among their own kin, and in their own house" (Mark 6:4). Like Jesus we too experience the hurt and frustration of not being heard by the people closest to us—the very people we most want to influence.

At one point my husband and I had four teenagers living in our house at the same time. I am sure we gave just about every speech given to an adolescent during that time frame. They were always very respectful, they seemed to listen, but sometimes you could just tell by their stance or the look on their face that our words of wisdom were being heavily filtered.

I remember sitting with one of our sons following a family wedding when he and his cousins had absconded with a six-pack of beer. I can still hear this handsome young man (who stood about fivefoot-one at the time) say to his father and me, "I know most fourteen-year-olds aren't old enough to drink beer, but I'm a lot more mature."

Years later, I found a picture from that wedding showing my son and his cousins standing with the groom. I asked my even more handsome, six-foot son if he remembered the wedding and the incident with the beer. He just shook his head and said, "Oh yeah, I was pretty dumb back then."

So have faith. More often than not that knowit-all teen with the rolling eyes will usually come around to appreciate your wisdom. I wonder if the same thing happened to the folks in Jesus' hometown. For their sake, I hope so.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Practice active listening. Ask one person in the family to talk about a problem they are having at home, school or work with which they would like help. Everyone else is to listen without interrupting. They may then ask questions to clarify what the person has said. When they are done listening, they can make suggestions. The person who was speaking tells each person how well he or she listened by giving him or her a grade of one to five. Five means you are a really good listener.

Are you a good listener? What can you do to become better at this important skill? What do you want to remember from last week?
