



Service to Others Metro Catholic Outreach



If you notice our numbers at the beginning of each newsletter, you can begin to understand how many folks without housing are coming into our office each day in need of food, hygiene supplies, maybe a pair of socks, a fresh T-shirt, even bus passes. This week alone, we gave out 164 homeless bags. We are only open four days each week, so this week we averaged 41 bags per day.

Everyday Metanoia



For a person who struggles with Paul, it amuses me how much his letters have been capturing my attention and prayer time lately. It would seem that Paul and I have entered a new phase of our relationship (LOL!) This week Paul talks about baptism and is teaching the Ephesians how the internal changes that come from the reception of that Sacrament should also be visible in external ways.

The Sacrament of Baptism will be an important part in the faith life of our family as my 7-year-old granddaughter is baptized this weekend. When Paul talks about baptism and when we read other accounts of baptism in the

Bible, we often think of adults, but the Acts of the Apostles includes several references to "whole households" being baptized, which would include children and infants.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church 1213 states, "Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as [children] of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission: 'Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water and in the word." CCC 1216 continues, "This bath is called enlightenment, because those who receive this [catechetical] instruction are enlightened in their understanding. Having received in Baptism the Word, 'the true light that enlightens every man,' the person baptized has ben 'enlightened', [and] becomes a '[child] of light,' indeed, [the person] becomes 'light' [themselves]: Baptism is God's most beautiful and magnificent gift...We call it gift, grace, anointing, enlightenment, garment of immortality, bath of rebirth, seal and most precious gift. It is called gift because it is conferred on those who bring nothing of their own; grace since it is given even to the guilty; Baptism because sin is buried in the water; anointing for it is priestly and royal as those who are anointed; enlightenment because it radiates light; clothing since it veils our shame; bath because it washes; and seal as it is our guard and the sign of God's Lordship." "Hence Baptism is a bath of water in which the 'imperishable seed' of the Word of God produces its life-giving effect. "(CCC 1228)

Thomas Merton in his book, The Inner Experience, says, "But seeds must grow and develop before you reap the harvest. There are thousands of Christians walking about the face of the earth bearing in their bodies the infinite God of Whom they know practically nothing. They are themselves [children] of God and are not aware of their identity."

Paul believes and teaches that this life giving effect should bring a union between the Will of God and the will of man to the effect that the baptized becomes a "new" person. Abraham Joshua Heschel in his Spiritual Anthology, I Asked For Wonder, has a poem entitled The Likeness of God that echoes what St. Paul is expressing in his letter to the Ephesians: "Verbally, we seem to be committed to the idea that man is created in the likeness of God. But are we committed to it intellectually? If the divine likeness is our premise, then the question arises: How should a being created in the likeness of God act, think, feel? How should we live in a way which is compatible with our being a likeness of God?" Wow, that is a question that we should be asking ourselves on a continual basis. That is why we should continually study, learn, pray, reflect and examine our thoughts and actions at the end of each day. Our lives should be a continual, albeit slow for most of us, shedding of the ways of humankind to reveal the light of Christ that we become through Baptism.

At many parishes, baptisms are private events, celebrated outside of the liturgy. I love that baptisms at All Saints are celebrated and witnessed with the entire community. Not only does each baptism give those assembled the opportunity to renew the baptismal promises that for many, were made by their parents; but the community is a vital part of living out those promises. As Ernest Kurtz and Katherine Ketcham share in their book, The Spirituality of Imperfection: "Spirituality is nurtured in community, the oneness with others that springs from shared vision and shared goal, shared memory and shared hope. As Ignatius of Antioch advised first-century Christians, one cultivates the 'way of life' that is spirituality by seeking out 'the company of the saints.': those seeking to live the same way of life. While spirituality can be discovered in solitude - by retreating to a cell of some kind, by reading, thinking, meditating and praying - it can be fulfilled only in community."

So as we witness the baptism of Eleanor Maxine Huk this weekend and renew our baptismal promises as she makes them for herself, I invite us to remember that we the All Saints community are an important part in helping her to grow in faith and to live out her life as a Child of God.

Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Invite someone you haven't seen in a while. Come, grow, live and love with the All Saints Parish Community.

Just Believe

The people become even more persistent after the miracle of the loaves and fishes. They follow Jesus across the sea. Jesus wonders if they are just following him because of the miracles. When they ask Jesus how they too can perform the works of God, he tells them they must believe in him.

There is a classic scene in the stage version of Peter Pan when the sparkling light that is Tinker Bell begins to dim. Peter looks out at the audience and tells them that Tinker Bell's light will go out forever if they can't convince her that they believe in her. Peter encourages the audience to clap as hard as they can to convince the little fairy of their belief. As the noise from the clapping grows louder and louder, the sparkle that is Tinker Bell grows brighter and brighter.

Wouldn't it be great if we could have our children just clap their hands to show they believe in Jesus? And wouldn't it be even greater if their clapping made Jesus' presence as real as Tinker Bell's light? Actually, making all of that happen isn't a whole lot more difficult.

Teach your children they can show they believe in Jesus by making their own little light shine. Help them to find different ways of making other people's lives brighter. Let them help you bake some favorite cookies for Grandma or cook a special surprise meal for Mom or Dad. Talk to them about how Jesus loved and took care of people. Help them to see the little light within them as Jesus' light.

If you want your child to believe in Jesus there are two things you can do. First, let him hear you talk about what Jesus means to you. Second, show her that you believe in Jesus by your actions. Let your child see the light burning brightly in your heart. Like the applause that convinced Tinker Bell that the audience believed she was real, your words and actions will prove to your child that Jesus is a reality in your life.

FAMILY RESPONSE

If your children know the song, "This Little Light of Mine," sing it together. Ask them what they think the little light is. Tell them that their Jesus-light shines brighter with every good thing they do. Talk about what they did last week and what they can do in the week coming up to make that light shine.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Your little light shines whenever you take time to talk about God/Jesus or your faith with your child. How do you feel about the family time you are taking each week as you reflect on the Scriptures? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

Bishop-elect Bullock's Ordination in Rapid City, South Dakota

Many have expressed an interest in attending the Ordination of Bishop-elect Bullock. We are excited to offer a pilgrimage from Iowa. We will confirm this bus trip when we have 50 paid registered participants on or before Thursday, August 8. If we exceed capacity for one bus, we will add registrants to a wait list and work to fill a second bus.

Trip includes:

- Charter bus to/from Rapid City, touring around Rapid City and to the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help
- Accommodations for 3 nights, including free hot breakfast
- Boxed lunch on Saturday & snacks on the bus
- Trip and Spiritual Guides

The tentative itinerary (subject to change):

- Saturday, September 21: Travel to Rapid City with pick up locations in Dubuque, Waterloo, Fort Dodge (depending on registrations) and a stop in Mitchell, SD, for a break.
- Sunday, September 22: Morning Mass, Mt. Rushmore, and Vespers at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.
- Monday, September 23: Morning touring of local sites and Ordination of Bishop-elect Scott Bullock followed by a reception at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.
- Tuesday, September 24: Return trip to Iowa.

2023-2024 All Saints Church End of the Year Report (July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024)



HOME RUNS

- \$1,288,652 was generously given for budget income that is \$88,652 more than was anticipated.
- \$25,337 was received for the improvement fund which supports the regular upkeep of our building and the grounds. This was \$2,337 over our projection.
- Expenses in all categories (personnel, subsidies, supplies, maintenance and overhead) were under budget totaling a savings of \$77,280.
- We are grateful for our parishioners who generously choose to gift their retirement account required minimum distribution to All Saints. This then becomes a Qualified Charitable Donation that benefits both the donor and All Saints.
- The number of parishioners who said "yes" this year to running in the election for Pastoral Council and the Faith Formation Committee increased over last year.
- A successful Blood Drive in February (another one scheduled for September 7!)
- The start of root beer floats after Mass last July by the Parish Life Committee, which was repeated this year after numerous requests.
- Replaced the 15-year old caulk around all the windows in the Social Hall.
- We are one of the few Catholic parishes in the metro area that still livestreams both the weekend and the daily liturgies. We feel it is an important link with parishioners who are homebound, ill or traveling.

BALL 4 - WALK TO BASE

- We are grateful to those who serve in liturgical ministry roles (lector, Eucharistic minister, hospitality, cantor, altar server), but we are in need of more.
- We love the energy and the community building that we witness at fellowships after Mass, but we need more groups to host these so they are after every Mass.

FULL COUNT - WAITING FOR THE NEXT PITCH

Attendance at the weekend liturgies has been flat. Many have not returned after the COVID pandemic. We miss the members of our community who do not attend. The Pastoral Council worked on and submitted a Parish Vitality Report to the Archdiocese of Dubuque. We hope to start rolling out the ideas and suggestions for continuing to build a vibrant parish this Fall.
