Everyday Metanoia



We are working our way through chapter 6 in the Gospel of John and what is typically known as "the Bread of Life discourse." It is a conversation between Jesus and a crowd that we hear over the course of five weekends. Throughout the dialogue with the people, Jesus uses the metaphor of bread to identify himself as the one sent by God, who through his obedience to the Father's will, becomes the "bread of life" for all of humankind.

We are in the midst of a three-year National Eucharistic Revival initiative sponsored by the US Bishops in response to the continuing decline of the population who identify as Catholic as well as the number of Catholics who attend Mass. It began on June 16, 2022. The mission of this, as found on the official website, is "to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist." The vision and hope is 'to inspire a movement of Catholics across the US who are healed, converted, formed and unified by an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist-and who are then sent out on mission 'for the life of the world."

I've talked about the importance of the community in several of my articles and it plays a prominent role in this desire for a renewed participation and life with the Eucharist as the source and summit of our earthly lives. Bishop Barron in his keynote address at the recent conference that was held in Indiana said this in his talk, "Christianity is not for ourselves - it is not a self-help program. Our Christianity is for the world, to enhance what is good and to transform that which is not." That is the beauty of our liturgies. In listening to the Word and receiving the Eucharist, God affirms the good in each of us and transforms that which is not so that as a renewed being we can go out into the world "living our faith radically and dramatically." Fr. Mike Schmitz in his address continued this thought saying, "God is in our midst, but not for our will and wants. He exists to transform our hearts [through the Word and the Eucharist] so we can live in communion with Him, seek His will, and thereby transform the world." On August 8, 2021, Pope Francis echoed these same thoughts: "Jesus wants to nourish the souls of those who are spiritually famished from the loneliness and anguish that come from life's difficulties. What does he not want? To be relegated to being considered a side dish - he who is bread - to be overlooked and set aside, or called on only when we need him."

So what are some concrete steps that we can take to form a deeper union with our Triune God, most especially through the reception of the Body and Blood of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, in the Eucharist? Bishop Barron identified three key areas of each of our lives to bring to prayer and to be transformed: poverty, chastity and obedience. He defined poverty not in terms of money, but rather as "coming to a place of detachment from wealth, pleasure, power and honor." Notice that he didn't say that we cannot have these things; but rather wants us to ask ourselves, "What is my relationship with these?" Do I seek these and depend on them or do I seek first the Kingdom of God and depend on God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit? If our hearts are consumed with the acquisition and the retention of worldly goods, then there is "no room for grace to flow in and to transform us." The next is chastity. He encouraged the listeners to "live one's sexuality in a morally and upright way." Like Thomas Aquinas taught, our cultural understanding of "love" needs to be reordered through the Word and the Eucharist to be "willing the good of the other." Wow, can you imagine the radical and dramatic change that this would make in our world? The last is obedience. To what voice do we listen - the worldly voice shouting for wealth, power, honor and pleasure or the voice of God encouraging, feeding and gracing us to be a good person by discerning and following the will of God? He ended by challenging all of us to engage with our "culture of self-invention; that being, I decide who I am and what my life is and what it will be about," so that through our transformation in poverty, chastity and obedience we can "bring the 'lumen' to the 'gentes' - bring the light to the world." Pope Francis reminds us that "[Jesus] is not one bread among many others, but the bread of life."

Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Invite someone you haven't seen in a while. Come, grow, live and love with the All Saints Parish Community.

Thank you! We have been blessed with the support from all our churches, individuals, and community supporters this past year. With your help we have been able to feed

Here are a few statistics at the end of our fiscal year:

- 8,048 boxes of food distributed to families
- 6,200 families served

The Bread of Life

The people are eager to follow Jesus and listen to his preaching and witness his miracles. However, when he begins to talk about how he is the Bread of Life, they take offense. Jesus, the carpenter, is comparing himself to the manna that saved the Israelites in the desert.

Those of us who have grown up with the Eucharist may not find Jesus' words, "I am the bread of life" too difficult to accept. For me, those words have always been a clear indication of how important receiving Jesus in the Eucharist really is. However, there is another understanding of Jesus as the Bread of Life, and we find it in the prayer Jesus gave his disciples, the Our Father.

When we pray the Our Father and ask for "our daily bread," we are petitioning for more than food and other necessary essentials. We are asking for more than the Eucharist. The Catechism tells us that in the Our Father the bread also refers to the Word of God, the Jesus we find in Scripture who lived, died and rose again.

We need food to live and sustain life just as we need Jesus to live and sustain us in God's life. The Eucharist is an incredible gift, but it is not the only way we can receive Jesus. We receive Jesus in a multitude of ways. We receive him whenever we love another or allow another to love us. We receive Jesus when we welcome a stranger or an outcast. We receive him when we appreciate and take care of the beautiful world around us. Jesus is no further than our own nose and as close as the breath we take in.

Try praying the Our Father with this in mind. Every day ask for the Bread of Life, Jesus, to come and fill your heart and mind with his strength and love so that you can love with his heart and live with his strength.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Say the Our Father together every night this week. When you are finished, ask everyone to say where they saw someone doing Jesus' work that day.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Reflect on the words, "Jesus is the Bread of Life."What do those words mean to you? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

Many have expressed an interest in attending the Ordination of Bishop-elect Bullock. We are excited to offer a pilgrimage from Iowa. We will confirm this bus trip when we have 50 paid registered participants on or before Thursday, August 8. Trip includes:
