Everyday Metanoia



Our second reading from the Letter of James is a seamless complement to last week's Gospel where we pondered Jesus' call of "Ephphatha - be opened."

As we walk and grow in our faith journey, it can be very beneficial to research the time, culture and people from the books of the Bible. Doing so can be like adding a special seasoning that totally opens up the flavor of a recipe. Just like the ability of a spice or sauce to meld and release the flavor of the other ingredients, knowing the background of the books of the Bible can open up the readings to reveal hidden nuances and

knit passages from one book to another. We hear and ponder God's Word in a new way.

In their commentary on the Letter of James, Kelly Anderson and Daniel Keating begin with a short summary for the introduction: "The brilliance of the Letter of James lies in its understanding of faith, the human person, and salvation. While at first glance the letter seems to contain simply a collection of councils and exhortations about proper conduct" (dos and don'ts) "its message is actually much more profound. James holds that a person's change of behavior begins with a change of heart. Because inner attitudes affect outward behaviors, he probes the interiority of the person, explaining where evil tendencies arise, how to fight them, how to progress along the way to maturity, how to tell whether one is progressing or regressing, and ultimately, how salvation is attained...James manifests a beautiful understanding of the Christian life and provides strong support for all [of us] limping painfully along the path of perfection." Wow! If that isn't the equivalent of a New York Times review for a best-selling personal growth book that has everyone running to the nearest Barnes and Noble - then I don't know what is. We should all have Bibles with dog-eared pages in the Letter of James. As Anderson and Keating identify, the relatability of the Letter of James is that it is not a "generic writing on holiness but a letter written by a pastor-teacher who is very aware of the concrete problems in the Christian communities..." which are still a part of our lives today. "It seems that the intended readers of James are struggling with both internal divisions and external pressure." We can connect with the letter of James, because on the one hand much has changed in the lives of Christians today compared to those in the first century A.D., but we, also, come to realize that on the other hand, several of life's challenges remain the same.

The relationship between faith and works has a long history of tension. Jesus' teachings embraced an interdependent and cooperative connection showing that faith is the cornerstone in our salvific relationship, but works are necessary as they express our understanding of God's Word and our grateful response to His grace in our lives. Just like our lives, we need to look at the context surrounding an event to interpret it correctly. This is true for the Bible also. Some of the division within Christianity and some of the heresies can be at least partially attributed to viewing verses in the New Testament in isolation. Anderson and Keating suggest that this contributed to the letter of James: "James seems to be responding to a misinterpretation of Paul's important teaching that Christians are justified by faith rather than works (Rom 3:28; Gal 2:16; Eph 2:8-9). It is clear from the Pauline Letters that faith should be completed by works, and that Christian conduct is crucial." Here again, knowing the background is most helpful. Paul was not drawing a line in the sand and separating faith and works, rather he was emphasizing the order of the two within their cooperative relationship. Some of the early Christians still clung to the heaviness of the Mosaic law and other rituals created by man without the love of God and the love of others as the guiding light for those actions. Paul's teaching on faith within context was to respond to this by getting his readers to "realize that salvation in Christ is a gift from God, not something that anyone can earn or achieve by human effort," but with the understanding that our response to that gift of salvation is realized through all that we say and do.

With all of this in mind, I invite you to read James 2:14-18 again. Does God reveal these verses in a new way? I will end with one caution: be mindful of the resources that you use. While the internet can be a great place to find quick and easy information, there can be errors or misrepresentations, too. For book resources look for a nihil obstat and imprimatur declaration. It can be found on one of the first few pages and means that the material is free of doctrinal or moral error. Happy exploring!

Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Invite someone you haven't seen in a while. Together let us hear and ponder God's Word on our journey of discipleship.

National Catholic Youth Conference



Considering the National Catholic Youth Conference in 2025?

The National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC) happens every year, but the Archdiocese typically takes part in odd years. NCYC 2025 is coming fast. The dates for NCYC '25 are November 20-23.

There are three ways for teens to experience NCYC.

1. Be a part of the Archdiocesan Delegation. Parish leaders (paid or volunteer) register their group with the Archdiocese. Package price of approximately \$850 per person covers travel, lodging, registration, some meals, and on-sight support. To join the Archdiocesan Delegation, we ask for group leaders to open a group account with the Archdiocese and submit a no-obligation group size estimate before December of 2024. Look for future announcements in the Official Bulletin and The InFo.

2. Organize a parish or collaborative/regional group. Work with other adults in your parish or other parishes near you to form your own group. Buy your own tickets. Book your own hotel rooms. Arrange your own transportation and meals. The Office of Youth Ministry will provide some tips and tricks to make it easier for you, but you will be independent of the Archdiocesan delegation.

3. Family option. Families can buy their own tickets and make travel plans without having to go through a parish. Sometimes, if your group is small, that is the easiest. A mom or dad with their own children can zip in and out a lot easier and likely save on costs.

School Fundraising 101 by Dan



With school finally back up to full speed, I thought I'd take this moment to teach a class that I'm calling School Fundraising 101. These are all very easy and affordable ways to lend our beloved school a hand one penny or dollar at a time. When we all work together, drops can fill up a bucket FAST. In our case here at All Saints and All Saints Schools, we have 2 buckets to drop our pennies and dollars into, so-to-speak.



This last school year, of all the parochial schools in Cedar Rapids, Hiawatha, and Marion, All Saints came in third in the Hy-Vee Cash 4 Students program. This is the first of the two buckets. The program is simple. When the clerk at Hy-Vee asks if you would like a

printed copy of your receipt... you say... YES, PLEASE! Please don't shout at them. They don't know how excited you are to help All Saints reach first place next Spring. Bring all your receipts from *Hy-Vee*, *Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh*, *Hy-Vee Gas*, and *Wahlburgers* to Mass with you and leave them in the bin next to the Parish office door. There is also a small bin at the back of the church if you enter through the Mount Vernon Road side of the sanctuary.

Here are two tips to maximize your efforts:

1. Be sure your receipts aren't expired. The program resets on April 1 every year so be sure to have those March (and older) receipts turned in BEFORE April 1. As we're currently in the middle of a cycle, if you have a stack of old receipts and you're ready to bring to Mass with you, PLEASE be sure they aren't older than April 1, 2024. Any receipts that are older than April 1 are discarded and no longer count toward our goal, unfortunately. Money left on the table. Sigh.

2. Be sure your receipts are not altered. All text they originally print with is required for them to count. Faded receipts or those with the bottom portion clipped will also not count. We recently received a large batch with everything from the date on down clipped and discarded. Although you may feel that this is keeping your identity secure, it does make the receipt unusable. Rest assured, however, that any personal information that may reside on these printed receipts is not enough to compromise your identity to potential thieves.

The second bucket is the Box Tops for Education program. This is a program that has existed for decades and has done a great deal of wonderful work for schools just like ours. Box Tops for Education (BTFE), however, has undergone some significant changes in recent years. Smart phones have allowed us all to provide charitable support to organizations of all kinds in easier and more creative ways. BTFE has embraced this technology so that we can maximize our charitable giving through their program. What this means then, is that the days of clipping box tops have ended. This week, in fact, we received a very large and generous donation of clipped box tops. Unfortunately, these don't function as they did before and will be discarded. The BTFE logo on the box of the qualifying product is simply a reminder that they do, in fact, qualify for the fundraising program. They're marked in a way that allows our volunteers to determine which receipts qualify for both BTFE and *Hy-Vee*. Yep! One qualifying receipt can help fill BOTH buckets, if all requirements are met, of course.

In a nutshell, if you purchase a BTFE-qualifying product at *Fareway*, *Wal-Mart*, *Target*, *Hy-Vee*, please give us those receipts! However, if you're smartphone-savvy, have the app., and would like to do the work of scanning your receipts, our volunteers would absolutely give you a well-deserved round of applause! BUT... they can only be scanned once to qualify so once you're done, feel free to recycle them... unless they're from *Hy-Vee*, of course. We'll take those!

One final note. I remember when I was a kid and my mom would fill a bag with Campbell's Soup labels because, like Box Tops, they raised money for my school. Unfortunately, this program ended in 2017 after raising over \$110 million in funding over 42 years! So please recycle those. They're no longer worth anything to our schools; only to our recycling bins.

Following these simple guidelines will allow us to maximize our fundraising efforts for All Saints. I'd love to see us race past second and first place to take the lead. If we can get all parents, grandparents, and parishioners on board, we can absolutely take the top spot this Spring. You've all been tasked... now... GO!

Family Ministry

September 15, 2024 • 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time • Mark 8:27–35

Take Up Your Cross

In a moment of grace, Peter speaks out proclaiming Jesus as the Christ. Jesus warns him not to tell anyone. Jesus goes on to predict his own rejection by the chief priests and scribes. He tells the apostles that he will suffer greatly, die and rise again on the third day.

Jesus asks us to accept the crosses that come to us in our lifetime. We are asked to accept all the limitations and problems that go along with being human. We are invited to give up the illusion that we can live a problem-free life and accept whatever unique limitations or challenges we encounter without whining and complaining. We are invited to follow Jesus and live our lives as fully and honestly as he lived his.

One of the most challenging responsibilities of parenting is helping our children accept their limitations as they work toward self-reliance. Remember when your toddler was learning to stand on his own? At some point you had to remove your fingers from his and watch him teeter back and forth. Sometimes he would fall; other times, he might reach back and grab your finger. This process of letting go and standing by continues until our children reach adulthood and learn to balance their independence with a healthy need for others.

The process of letting go isn't always easy, but at some point we need to step aside, especially when the problem is of the child's own making. Sometimes we must allow our children to experience the consequences of missing the bus or forgetting their homework. At the same time, we teach faithfulness and trust when we are there for the real emergencies.

Children learn to rely on God by witnessing our trust in God and by being taught to pray for the support they need. We know we have been successful as parents when our children can stand on their own, knowing they do not stand alone. Now if we could only learn that lesson ourselves.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask each person to think about last week and name something they are thankful for. Talk about where they need God's help in the coming week. Say a prayer listing your thanks and naming each need.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

How are you helping your child/children become self-reliant? In what areas of your life do you need to become more self-reliant? In what areas do you need to learn how to ask for help? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

Lord, when did we see you hungry

CATECHETICAL SUNDAY 2024 "FINDING CHRIST"

Paul Jarzembowski, Associate Director, USCCB, Laity, Marriage, Family Life, and Youth When Jesus invites us to look to the margins to see him more clearly (cf. Mt 25), we naturally ask the question: "What margins?" These are the places in our peripheral vision in life, the locations where we often forget to look and that lie just outside our regular field of view. More importantly, we can find ourselves forgetting about the people who occupy those oft-forgotten spaces.

It can be easy to find Christ reflected in the familiar and the explicitly sacred. Yet for young adults, now is an opportune time in life to practice finding Christ in the margins: in the faces of the people who live and breathe and move just beyond or outside our regular routines.

What follows is a discernment tool that offers some initial questions that can lead a person to discover their own peripheries and the people they may overlook or take for granted.

- What does your normal daily or weekly routine look like? It may be helpful to write it out.
- Where do you travel on a normal basis (by foot, by car, by public transportation, etc.)? What neighborhoods, communities, or locations do you pass by throughout your day?
- Who are the people you encounter regularly? Family? Friends? Colleagues or co-workers?
- With these questions in mind, can you then identify the places you visit along the way, but do not stay too long (i.e., the gas station, the grocery store, the coffee shop, etc.)? Can you picture in your mind the individuals you meet in those spaces, but who you do not engage with for more than a few minutes at most? Bring them to mind in a prayer of thanksgiving.
- Within those marginal spaces, who do you envision might be similar to the groups Jesus mentions in his parable of the end times (Mt 25)?
 - Who are those who go hungry? Who has no shelter or are likely one paycheck away from eviction? Who are those who are suffering from physical or mental health issues? Who may struggle with crime and incarceration? Who are those of advanced age: the elderly, the infirm, the grandparents, or those facing terminal illness?
- Who do you think about during the regular giving seasons and holidays (such as Thanksgiving or Christmas) but don't think about in the other months of the year?
- Take time to reflect on the people who you encounter in work or school who you pass by, perhaps only going as far as offering a quick "hello" or wave of the hand. Who do you see frequently but barely know their names? Again, bring them to mind with prayerful gratitude.

As you work through these discernment questions, you may be able to find Christ hidden in peripheral areas, and in so doing, allow the Lord to engage you in the margins of your life
