

Everyday Metanoia



Currently, I am listening to a series of podcasts on the Hallow app that review and teach about the various ways that we can pray. Imaginative prayer was included in last week's line up and could be used for reflection with this Sunday's Gospel. It might be helpful to enter into pray with Mark 9:30-37 in the role of all three of the main characters one at a time: as Jesus; as Peter; and as the other disciples.

If we imaginatively enter into the first part of this story as Jesus, we might feel the fullness of his humanity. Jesus has a difficult, but important message to impart to the apostles - his immanent suffering, death and resurrection. When we have challenging news to impart to family and friends, we usually do not do so in a crowd of people;

rather, we gather them in a quiet location that is apart from others. Jesus does the same. The first time that Jesus told his disciples about what was coming, we know that Peter reacted in shocked denial which led to a sharp retort from Jesus. What might Jesus be feeling or anticipating from this second round? Might he feel frustrated? Might he be hopeful that the apostles will understand this time? Might he have rehearsed several reactions from the disciples just like we do sometimes? All of these emotions are very human and can help us feel closer to Jesus. We can trust Jesus because he knows our humanity - he "gets" us.

If we imaginatively enter into the second part of this story as Jesus, we feel his patience. While he might be humanly frustrated with their petty argument, we do not get a sense that Jesus is angry. He does not rebuke them, but rather he sits them down and gently teaches them (once again) how Christian ministry should look as we work to make the kingdom of God visible on earth. Mary Healy in her commentary on Mark says, "...he turns human thinking on its head: the only way to fulfill [this], paradoxically, is to put oneself last in priority. And this is not merely a pious thought, it must be expressed in concrete actions, by becoming a servant of all. This was a radically unconventional idea in the ancient world, where humility and meekness were viewed not as virtues, but as signs of weakness."

If we imaginatively enter into the first part of this story as Peter, we might feel confusion and some trepidation. Jesus is saying that something horrible is going to happen. Why is Jesus talking about this again? What is he really trying to say? Jesus uses symbolic language so many times - is this another instance? Peter was rebuked after his first response to Jesus; we can understand his desire to stay silent this second time even though he still does not comprehend the reality of what Jesus is saying. Has a family member or friend ever told us about a bad health diagnosis? Have we, perhaps, reacted just as Peter, even when the facts are repeated after our initial disbelief?

If we imaginatively enter into the second part of this story as Peter, so many conflicting emotions might come to the fore. Did Peter take part in the dispute for who was the greatest? Jesus had identified Peter as a chosen one more than once. During the debate among the apostles did he assert himself as such or was he silent; quieted by the many times that he had disappointed Jesus and fretting as to his "status" with the Teacher?

If we imaginatively enter into the first part of this story as the disciples, how do we feel about the news that Jesus is imparting? We still believe that Jesus will be a "leader" as in ancient times - that he will eventually wield his authority and rise to power and glory. Why is Jesus talking about death again and...what is going to happen to us? Will we be killed, too, or has Jesus been teaching us in order for us to take the reigns of glory that he is to initiate? After a friend, co-worker or family member has shared some challenging news, have some of our first thoughts ever been, "How will this impact me?" Heavy thoughts. Serious thoughts. The response of silence if very understandable as the disciples contemplate their future.

If we imaginatively enter into the second part of this story as the disciples, we wonder about what started the competition among them. Healy comments, "Having just heard Jesus speak of his willing acceptance of rejection and death, they are suddenly preoccupied with jealous competition for privilege and prestige. No conversation could have been more contrary to what he was trying to impart to them. Yet, Mark, once again, does not display the disciples' failures so his readers can marvel at their ineptitude. Rather, it is to bring us face-to-face with our human tendencies to seek our own glory in competition with others, which hinder us from yielding ourselves to God's marvelous plan."

Thank you for entering into imaginative prayer with me during our reflection on this Sunday's Gospel from Mark. I invite us to take the thoughts and emotions that arose during this time to prayer this week as we continue on the way to understanding and living the Christian life that God calls us to. Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Invite someone you haven't seen in a while. Take the time to introduce yourself to someone that you don't know. The burdens and joys of a journey are better when shared.

National Catholic Youth Conference



Considering the National Catholic Youth Conference in 2025?

The National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC) happens every year, but the Archdiocese typically takes part in odd years. NCYC 2025 is coming fast. The dates for NCYC '25 are November 20-23.

There are three ways for teens to experience NCYC.

- **1. Be a part of the Archdiocesan Delegation.** Parish leaders (paid or volunteer) register their group with the Archdiocese. Package price of approximately \$850 per person covers travel, lodging, registration, some meals, and on-sight support. To join the Archdiocesan Delegation, we ask for group leaders to open a group account with the Archdiocese and submit a no-obligation group size estimate before December of 2024. Look for future announcements in the Official Bulletin and The InFo.
- **2. Organize a parish or collaborative/regional group.** Work with other adults in your parish or other parishes near you to form your own group. Buy your own tickets. Book your own hotel rooms. Arrange your own transportation and meals. The Office of Youth Ministry will provide some tips and tricks to make it easier for you, but you will be independent of the Archdiocesan delegation.
- **3. Family option.** Families can buy their own tickets and make travel plans without having to go through a parish. Sometimes, if your group is small, that is the easiest. A mom or dad with their own children can zip in and out a lot easier and likely save on costs.

School Fundraising 101 Follow-Up by Dan



After last week's article published, I was provided with last year's Hy-Vee Cash 4 Students results. I'm sure that many of you were wondering just how close from the top spot All Saints actually was. Your patience has paid off because I'm about to blow your mind with the actual dollars and cents. The list provided includes all of Cedar Rapids, Marion, Hiawatha, and surrounding communities for a grand total of 89 schools.

First place in the 2023-2024 race was Trinity Lutheran School with a grand total of \$3,892.48. Second place was earned by LaSalle Catholic School with a total of \$3,735.39. And third place was All Saints with a grand total of... drum roll please... \$3,131.49. The difference between third and first place is a mere \$760.99.

\$760.99 sounds like an absolute piece of cake to me. With that said, the next time you're at Hy-Vee buying a slice of cake, or you're at Hy-Vee Gas filling your tank, be

sure to print that receipt. The key factor in making that relatively short jump from third to first place, however, is to make absolutely certain that you bring those receipts to the office in a timely manner. Late receipts are simply missed opportunities as All Saints approaches that first place finish. Now go make at least \$800 worth of

All Saints Financial Update



Financial Update as of 8/30/2024:

All Saints Parish is in need of your participation and help. Budget income for August declined by \$23,560 from July to August of this year. We typically experience a small decline from July to August, but we are \$26,758 below this same time as last year. A parish is not just the bricks and mortar, it is not the staff, and it is not all the programs available. A parish is the people who attend Mass and contribute their time, talents and treasure to the vitality and needs of the parish. The parish staff works with the Pastoral

Council and the Finance Council to keep our expenses as low as possible. We are stewards of the funds you generously donate and we take that very seriously. The Last Shall Be First

As Jesus travels with his disciples, he hears them arguing among themselves. When he discovers that they are arguing about which of them is the greatest, Jesus reminds them that those who will be the greatest or the first, will be those who were servants to all and vulnerable like small children.

Jesus is frustrated with his apostles. He is trying to talk to them about important things and they are concerned about who of them is the greatest. They want to know who is first in Jesus' eyes. Jesus responds to them by telling them he measures a person's greatness by how much concern they have for others—especially their concern over those who are considered unimportant.

Sounds like a family story to me. I think the words, "Me, me, me" or "Me first," must resound at some time or another in every family kitchen and backyard in America. The world could stop revolving around the sun and the stars could fall from the heavens and some youngster somewhere would be upset that they are not the center of attention.

This is what being a child is like. The littler they are the more dependent they are on others, and the more they need to make sure they are not forgotten. Sometimes it seems that little ones need to be constantly recognized—constantly reassured they are first in your life. As parents, we are expected to patiently answer our toddler's "Me, me, me" with a reassuring smile and pat. Gradually and gently, as they grow older, we begin to teach them to put others, younger, more vulnerable than themselves, first.

In this Gospel Jesus tells us, "Whoever welcomes one child such as this in my name welcomes me." This is good to remember when traveling in a car for several hours with more than one preschooler screaming, "Me," "Mine" or "Me first."



Archbishop to celebrate Archdiocesan Rural Life Mass recognizing those who work the land and live in our rural communities

On Friday, September 20, Archbishop Thomas Zinkula will celebrate his first-ever Rural Life Mass in the Archdiocese, hosted by the Johanningmeier and Deering families at Distant View Farms in Monona. This special event will recognize the many people who work the land and live in our rural communities.

After the Mass, there will be a blessing of the animals and farm equipment, a recognition program, and a free-will offering lunch hosted by St. Patrick Parish, Waukon.

Deacon Brian Zeman, Director of Life, Earth, and Social Justice Ministry in the Archdiocese of Dubuque, and Fr. John Moser, Pastor at St. Patrick in Waukon, led the efforts to organize the Mass.

"The Archdiocese of Dubuque is a vast area that consists of 17,000 square miles of geography. Much of that geography is small rural communities, farmland, and people who work the land," Deacon Zeman pointed out. "There's much focus given to Dubuque sometimes because we are the Archdiocese of Dubuque, but the archdiocese is made up of much more rural geography than metropolitan."

Although Archbishop Zinkula currently resides within the city limits of Dubuque, he is no stranger to rural life – he grew up on an Iowa farm along with his eight siblings. He is excited to celebrate this Farm Mass in rural Allamakee County.

"Archbishop Zinkula grew up on a farm. He understands their hardships, their joys, and wants to celebrate their rural life and the way they contribute to what is the majority of our archdiocese," Deacon Zeman added.

He also reflected on the ways in which the seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching intersect with life at the farm, although many people do not realize it. Care for God's Creation, The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers, Solidarity – these values can be identified in the way that farmers steward the land, offer opportunities for workers, and in the solidarity of people who are working to produce foods and goods for the benefit of our human family.

There is even an organization, Catholic Rural Life, that is dedicated to the vitality of the American countryside. Since 1923, the national nonprofit organization has promoted Catholic life in rural America.

In order to learn more about organizing a rural life Mass, Deacon Zeman and Fr. Moser attended the organization's 100-year anniversary celebration last May. At this celebration, they were able to meet with the organization's leadership as well as others who have coordinated these Masses. The Archdiocese of Dubuque now has a formal commitment to work with Catholic Rural Life in the future. In order to bring such a Mass to the Archdiocese of Dubuque, Deacon Zeman also drew inspiration from a rural life Mass held in the diocese of La Crosse, Wisconsin.

The hosts of the Archdiocese of Dubuque Rural Life Mass, the Johanningmeier and Deering families, are looking forward to the gathering of the faithful from across the archdiocese that will be held on their property.

"It's an honor to be chosen to host Archbishop Zinkula's first Rural Life Mass in the Archdiocese of Dubuque and to share our gratitude for life on the farm with our church community. We are blessed to live this life every day, and although it is hard work and there are many sacrifices, it has many great rewards to be living, nurturing, and protecting the land and the animals of God," the Johanningmeier family said. "We want to demonstrate how our trust and faith guide us each and every day – to be witnesses to the glory of God in farm life."

"This is an opportunity to share God's gift to us with others and possibly even some who haven't experienced God's love for the farm."

The upcoming rural life Mass is not the only time that the families at Distant View have opened up their farm to their community.

"Every year we host many elementary classes for field trips to the farm. We are honored to share our farm with them and to teach them where milk and meat come from, how the crops are grown to feed the animals, and how to make other food for people. Food is a gift from God that he entrusts the farmer to raise and provide," the Johanningmeiers explained.

"With fewer and fewer farms, many of our youth do not get to learn that food doesn't come from a factory or store, it comes from God's gift of nature and the land and animals. We've hosted many other community events to generate agricultural awareness and education for others including the Hay Expo, Cattleman's Association, and local Fire Department events to name a few."

Education is an essential component to ensuring that the knowledge necessary to maintain and steward farmland is not lost over time.

The Johanningmeier family recognizes that their efforts and daily work ensure the current success of their farm and help preserve the viability of their land for generations to come.

"God is not making more land, so we need to take care of what we have and preserve it for future generations. We have been connected to the land for our whole life and it is our dream that our family remains connected to the land. We don't farm to live, we live to farm," the Johanningmeiers said.


