



Everyday Metanoia



Today's Gospel reading focuses on Stewardship - a term we often throw about in our church world. But what does it actually mean? What is a steward? The USCCB in their Pastoral Letter on Stewardship (Stewardship: A Disciple's Response) describes it as, "one who receives God's gifts gratefully, cherishes and tends them in a responsible and accountable manner, shares them in justice and love with others, and returns them with increase to the Lord." To fully engage in stewardship, we start with answering God's call to being a disciple - a follower of our Lord Jesus Christ. "This has astonishing implications: mature disciples make a conscious decision to follow Jesus, no matter what the cost; Christian disciples experience conversion - life shaping

changes of mind and heart - and commit their very selves to the Lord; Christian stewards respond in a particular way to the call to be a disciple. Stewardship has the power to shape and mold our understanding of our lives and the way in which we live." Let's take a closer look at this statement.

Mature disciples make a conscious decision to follow Jesus, no matter what the cost. Making disciples is the third prong of our parish mission statement. This means that our pastor, the staff, the leadership councils and committees all work together to make sure that the resources we receive from God and from our generous parishioners are cultivated and shared with others so that they are returned with increase to the Lord. The Finance Council and the Parish Plant Committee allocate the talents of parishioners and contractors, alike so that our buildings and campus are well maintained. They review the generous funds that we receive, saving for expenses that may occur in the future. The Faith Formation Commission, the Liturgy Committee, staff and volunteers work to ensure that the Word of God is shared now with adults, teens and children and will be for future generations. The Pastoral Council collaborates with other groups, staff and volunteers to make certain that resources are secured and programming is developed to meet all of us where we are at on our faith journey, but, also to encourage and provide for our growth. Part of that growth is learning to make God a priority and to name and release the other gods in our lives.

Christian disciples experience conversion - life shaping changes of mind and heart - and commit their very selves to the Lord. This is metanoia! When we recognize and allow events and people in our life to work with God to shape and change our hearts and minds. Sometimes it is joy-filled people and happy events that do this, but more often than not, it is the people and events that we wish we could have avoided. Our secular culture often pushes us away from any serious reflection that can lead to change by reversing the primary focus away from our own needs and more on the needs of our brothers and sisters in this world. "People who want to live as Christian disciples and Christian stewards face serious obstacles. In the United States and other nations, a dominant secular culture often contradicts religious convictions about the meaning of life. This culture frequently encourages us to focus on ourselves and our pleasures. At times, we can find it far too easy to ignore spiritual realities and to deny religion a role in shaping human and social values. As Catholics who have entered into the mainstream of American society and experienced its advantages, many of us also have been adversely influenced by this secular culture. We know what it is to struggle against selfishness and greed, and we realize that it is harder for many today to accept the challenge of being a Christian steward. It is essential, therefore, that we make a special effort to understand the true meaning of stewardship and live accordingly."

Christian stewards respond in a particular way to the call to be a disciple. "Stewards of God's gifts are not passive beneficiaries. We cooperate with God in our own redemption and in the redemption of others. We are also obliged to be stewards of the Church - collaborators and cooperators in continuing the redemptive work of Jesus Christ, which is the Church's essential mission. This mission - proclaiming and teaching, serving and sanctifying - is our task. It is the personal responsibility of each one of us as stewards of the Church. All members of the Church have their own roles to play in carrying out its mission: Parents, who nurture their children in the light of faith; parishioners, who work in concrete ways to make their parishes true communities of faith and vibrant sources of service to the larger community; all Catholics, who give generous support - time, money, prayers, and personal service according to their circumstances - to parish and diocesan programs and to the universal Church."

Come, help All Saints Parish grow and evolve as we each experience our own conversion and desire to walk with the Lord. A great place to start would be our Stewardship Committee. They meet in the Parish Library on the 1st Tuesday of every month starting at 6:30 PM.

Come Holy Spirit and show us the way on our journey. See you at Mass!

What Are You Known For? Anni Thorn, MCO Associate Director

Luke 19:1-10:

Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. A man was there by the name of Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was wealthy. He wanted to see who Jesus was, but because he was short he could not see over the crowd. So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore-fig tree to see him, since Jesus was coming that way.

When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down immediately. I must stay at your house today." So he came down at once and welcomed him gladly. All the people saw this and began to mutter, "He has gone to be the guest of a sinner." But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, "Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount." Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost."

Reflection:

Zaccheus is known for being short. Not only is he short in stature, he comes up wanting in other areas of his life as well. Tax collectors were Jewish men who were hired by the Roman government to collect taxes from the Jewish people. The taxes were exorbitant, leaving them in extreme poverty. To make matters worse, tax collectors were known to collect additional monies to line their own pockets. They lived a luxurious life while their own community suffered. In response, synagogues banned them from entry. They could no longer worship with their community. Their families disowned them and they walked through the streets flanked with armed guards for fear of retribution. Tax collectors were a despised lot. Zaccheus was well known. He was known for his short stature and lack of character. As chief tax collector, Zaccheus knew what it was like to be hated. He knew what it felt like to walk the streets and receive dirty looks, eyes that looked away, whispers, and backs turned. Zaccheus was an outcast. Though he lived a life of material wealth, his internal life was impoverished. He came up short in what really mattered, meaningful relationships and a sense of belonging. Zaccheus was short indeed. We can only imagine the loneliness and hidden grief that plagued him.

Have you ever felt the sting of rejection or felt like you didn't belong? If you do, you know the weight of loneliness and grief. Do the most vulnerable amongst us feel similar to Zaccheus? Do they experience dirty looks, hushed whispers, eyes that look away or backs turned? Do they carry the weight of public scorn? Do we treat them as if they come up short in life?

What are you known for?

Prayer: Lord Jesus, if we are honest with ourselves, we know that we come up short in our own lives, in the lives of those around us and in our relationship with you. Yet, you cover us with your grace and mercy. Let us dole out what you give so freely to us, especially to those who are on the margins of life, those who are living a lonely and outcast life. Instead of turning away, may we turn towards with our eyes raised and arms opened. May we be known for being compassionate and full of grace. Amen.

Retirement Fund for Religious

The Archdiocese will not be collecting for the Retirement Fund for Religious collection as a stand-alone collection this year. Instead, the Retirement Fund for Religious will be one of the beneficiaries of the Spring Our Call to Share Collection in May. If you receive materials in the mail, please recycle them.

The primary reason for this change is the relatively high degree of misunderstanding that Archdiocesan Catholics had about who this collection actually supports. Many believed funds from this collection go to support our retired priests (they don't), while others believe funds from this collection go to supporting religious congregations in the Archdiocese (they could potentially, but haven't anytime recently). Making the collection a part of Our Call to Share will provide the Archdiocese the ability to do that.

organizations, planting seeds of faith, education, hospitality and service that have transformed countless lives.



November 10, 2024 • 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time • Mark 12:38-44

Living Life With a Generous Heart

Jesus mentions widows twice in this reading. The first time is when he strongly criticizes the scribes for walking around in fine robes while they "devour widows' houses" (v. 40) The second reference is when he points out a generous widow who puts her whole livelihood into the collection.

The widow in this Gospel was certainly a woman of faith and an example to all of us. However, I don't think Jesus is telling us that we are all expected to give away everything we have and just trust in him. This is what he told the rich man, of course, and what he seems to be praising in this story of the widow.

But the call to poverty is a specific call and not one that all of us are meant to live. What I do think Jesus expects of us is to live our lives with a generous heart and with the same faith the widow had as she gave her last two coins away. There is a clear message here that we are not to live like the scribes, enjoying the high life, driving expensive cars, wearing fine clothes at the expense of other people. Jesus is also quite clear about sharing what we have with those who are in need. We are not to give just from the extra money we have, the surplus, but also from our bounty. It may not be necessary to give everything away, but we should give away enough to at least feel the pinch.

Jesus also calls us to live our lives poor in spirit, not getting too comfortable with what we have or what we earn. Financial security is no longer a given reality even for folks who work hard, have a dozen degrees and have served a company loyally for years. The widow gave up her livelihood willingly, but in today's economic world some of us are forced into that situation involuntarily. Like the widow, we need to know that no matter what happens we will be OK. We need her faith in a God who always provides.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask everyone to go through their toys or clothes and choose at least two things they can give to people in need. When they have finished, gather again and talk about what you are giving away. Make sure you are giving from your bounty and not just your surplus.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Have you ever had to live without some of the daily essentials of life? How did you cope? How do you think you would cope? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 12:38-44

This Sunday's Gospel is a call for us all to share ourselves with others. The widow gives to the Temple two small coins that are significant to her livelihood. Jesus contrasts that with the showy gifts most people gave to the Temple treasury. They gave something of their great abundance. The widow gave of herself. We are all called to do the same—to give of ourselves.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned that everyone's gift is important. Take a few minutes to talk with your child about what important gifts each member of your family possesses. Make sure your child understands why the small amount of money the widow gave in the Gospel story was so important.

Promise (Grades K–1): In class this week, your child learned about generosity in giving. Play the game on page 2 with your child. (He or she will teach you how.) You can also play the game with real personal treasures. Post the "I Can Give" envelope on your refrigerator or bulletin board. All members of the family can enclose gift certificates for one another in the envelope.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week, your child learned about generosity and trust in God from the two widows in Sunday's readings. The first widow generously gave of the little she had to feed Elijah and trusted that her family would be cared for. The woman in the Gospel gave what little she had for the good of others. Invite your child to share these stories with the family. Talk about how the Seventh Commandment is about respecting the rights and property of others.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week, your youngster learned about both the Gospel and the Old Testament reading from Sunday Mass. Through the stories of two widows, your son or daughter discovered examples of generosity. The class learned about the value of the collection at Mass as a way to help spread the Good News. Finally, the class explored the Catholic social teaching about rights and responsibilities. Talk about ways your family shows generosity. Discuss ways your family can help protect the rights of others.

Visions (Grades 7–9): This week, your youngster's class learned that the choices they make are good indicators of their values. They learned from the Gospel that true generosity means giving from the heart and giving what is important to each of them. Ask your youngster to share with the family the story, "The Widow's Gift." Talk about the real meaning of the word charity. List the activities, people, and things that your family values most. How does sharing these with others indicate your desire to follow Jesus as his disciple?

Pray Together

Before an evening meal, offer prayers of thanksgiving for all the people who have given generously to your family. Talk about how you can best repay their generosity by "paying it forward," that is, by being helpful and generous to others.
