

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 5th Sunday of Easter. In the first reading from the Acts of the Apostle, we are invited to follow Paul and Barnabas as they travel to new cities proclaiming the Word and making disciples. What is interesting is that it is noted that they returned to some of the cities where they had previously been in order to "strengthen the spirits of the disciples and exhorted them to persevere in the faith..." Hmm, could this have some bearing and some tie to our return each week to Sunday Mass? The Catechism of the Catholic Church 2192 states, "Sunday...is to be observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal Church. On Sundays and other holy days of obligation the faithful are bound to participate in the Mass." Ok, but why?

We don't repeat the Sacraments, so why is returning to Mass each week so important?

I think that Paul and Barnabas witnessed what many of us still encounter today - that is that our initial zeal and dedication eventually wane over time. Think of New Year's resolutions. We need someone and/or something to keep us motivated and to keep us strong so that we can be a witness and an invitation for others. In our Catholic faith, we are graced with God and the Eucharist. Sherry Weddell in her book, Forming Intentional Disciples says, "I don't think that it is an accident that the Church uses the metaphor of a summit to convey the significance of the Eucharist. The Eucharist is described as the summit, the apex, and the pinnacle of the Christian life because it contains 'the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch' (CCC 1324).Just as we have to actively climb a mountain summit, we have to make an intentional journey, properly prepared to receive the inexhaustible grace to be found in the Eucharistic Christ…The Mass is designed to nourish the lives of those who have already decided to follow Jesus Christ up the foothills and through the forests of personal faith and discipleship." I am sure that when Paul and Barnabas returned to various cities that they continued to evangelize, that is to convert new believers to Christ. But this reading from the Acts of the Apostles makes it clear that their main intent was to strengthen and nourish those who had already become disciples. We, too, need this strengthening and nourishment to keep ourselves strong so as to be a beacon of light and hope for our brothers and sisters, both those who are disciples and those who are not yet.

In our reading from the Acts of the Apostles, Paul and Barnabas also reminded the disciples that "it is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God." What do we do when we are going to undergo some hardship? We prepare as best as we can for it. If we are going to run a marathon, we must train by running successfully longer routes for many months. If we are going to have surgery, we prepare by eating nutritious foods and setting up our home to support us when we return. The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (Sacrosanctum Concilium) from Vatican II states in its opening introduction that this document has several aims, but the one that echoes that of Paul and Barnabas is "to strengthen whatever can help to call the whole of mankind into the household of the Church." For the Church the liturgy is the gift through which this is revealed and made concrete to humankind. Vatican II recalled the faithful from passive to full, active, conscious participation in the liturgy and made clear the importance of preparation for the Sunday liturgy. So how do we do that? The United States Catholic Catechism for Adults has several practical suggestions:

- "approach the Mass with the intention of participating fully and actively in the celebration, singing the hymns and psalms and reciting the prayers with conviction and faith
- read and pray over the Scripture texts for the Sunday liturgy...pray for light from God's Word on your needs
- spend time learning about the Mass; it's structure, intentions and the meanings within the prayers and the rituals
- come to Mass with a community-minded attitude. Keep in mind that liturgy is a communal act of worship in which faith is strengthened by contact with other believers in a context where the Holy Spirit is forming the worshippers into the unity of the Church, the Body of Christ
- always remember the sacrifice of the Mass is the Church's greatest prayer of praise and thanksgiving to God the Father in which the Lord Jesus is truly present as Savior of the world and is received in the Sacrament of the Eucharist as food for eternal life."

If you haven't already set aside time each week to prepare to be nourished and strengthened, I invite you to pray about it. The early apostles and disciples knew that the ways of the world were not the ways of God. In order to stay strong for ourselves and for each other, we need preparation, nourishment and strengthening. (Cue in the band Survivor singing the Eye of the Tiger). See you at Mass!

The Archdiocese of Dubuque is honored to host a leg of the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, which makes its way from Indianapolis to Los Angeles from mid-May to the Feast of Corpus Christi. Eight



Perpetual Pilgrims, four young men and four young women, will accompany the Blessed Sacrament on this nearly cross-country journey and will be our guests from May 23-27, 2025. This event will correspond with the Presbyteral Ordination weekend at the Cathedral of St. Raphael. It will also be the first major public event at the newly renovated Cathedral of St. Raphael, the mother church of the Archdiocese!

There will be many opportunities for Eucharistic encounters as the Blessed Sacrament visits a beautiful crosssection of our Archdiocese. On Friday evening, May 23rd, we will receive Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament from the Diocese of Davenport on the banks of the Mississippi River. Over the subsequent days, the faithful are encouraged to accompany Jesus to the far western edge of our Archdiocese when He and the Perpetual Pilgrims depart Tuesday morning, May 27th, from Ames to the Diocese of Des Moines.

- 1. It's an opportunity to express our devotion to our Lord present in the Blessed Sacrament both individually and as a local church.
- 2. It's an opportunity to pray for vocations. (We all want to retire someday, right?)
- 3. It is a public witness to the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist and an opportunity to evangelize.
- 4. In a certain way, a Eucharistic procession is a means of embodying synodality. Here we have the local church—priests, deacons, laypeople, and (hopefully) religious—gathered with our archbishop to walk together with the Lord.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

"Habemus Papam!" "We have a pope!"

Together with the faithful of the Archdiocese of Dubuque, I give thanks to God for the gift of our new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV! Let's offer him our love, loyalty, and prayerful support as he begins his pontificate. The cardinal electors, cooperating with the Holy Spirit and supported

by the prayers of the faithful, elected a pope with a pastoral heart. His address from the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica was a clarion call for greater unity and the proclamation of the Gospel.

Speaking first in Italian, he said, "May we all build bridges through dialogue and encounter so that we can be one people in peace." Moments later, he acknowledged the spiritual roots of his Augustinian order of priests, citing a sermon by St. Augustine on the anniversary of his ordination in which he said, "With you, I am a Christian; for you, I am a bishop." This sermon from antiquity is known for blending deep, personal humility with the corresponding responsibility and authority of the office.



Family Ministry

May 18, 2025 • 5th Sunday of Easter • John 13:31-33, 34-35

Jesus Gives a New Commandment

Jesus tells his disciples that he will only be with them for a little while longer. He then gives them a new commandment: "...[L]ove one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (vv. 34–35)..

Every time I read Paul's description of the love Jesus practiced and in turn expects his disciples to practice, I cringe. Paul writes, "Love is patient... it does not insist on its own way..." (1 Corinthians 13:4–5). Perhaps this is such a difficult notion to embrace because patience does not come easily to me. When I was raising my children, it seemed an impossible feat to maintain my patience.

I love my children, and I would give my life for them. But there were times when they were young that I was anything but patient and mild-tempered. At one point, I had a six-year-old, three little ones under the age of three and a husband who traveled.

There were days when the children teased each other, screamed and fought, and I joined right in, screaming even louder. I would go to bed hating myself, resolving to keep my cool the next day, but I'd get up in the morning and before noon I would lose my temper again. Finally, on a retreat, I learned that there were some things about ourselves that we just can't change through sheer willpower. No matter how much we want to, no matter how many times we try, we just can't do it.

So, as the retreat director had suggested, I turned it over to God. Every morning, I asked God for the patience I needed to get me to lunch. At lunch, I prayed to make it to dinner, at dinner, to bedtime. And it worked. After a few weeks I woke up to a different household. Because I was calmer, so were the kids. God's patient love became mine. I'd like to say the change was permanent, but it wasn't. I'd break the cycle and have to start praying hourly all over again. But I learned something very important through it all. I learned that the love Paul was talking about in 1 Corinthians is God's love, which is even more powerful than a mother's love. The good news is that this love is mine for the asking, and once I receive it I am free to share it with my children.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Talk about what a mystery is, and remind each other that God will always be a mystery. Then name the things you know about God.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Read John 1:1–14, and ponder the mystery of our Triune God. Let go of your need to know everything, and trust that God is with you and in you. Sit quietly with certainty. Reflect on the experience.



Gospel Weeklies

May 11, 2025 4th Sunday of Easter

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 10:27-30

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus portrays himself as the Good Shepherd. This metaphor demonstrates the warm and loving care a shepherd has for the sheep and also shows that it is this warm loving care that Jesus has for us all. The image of the Good Shepherd is one of the central images of Jesus Christ, who keeps us from danger and seeks us out when we are lost.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned about the Good Shepherd, who cares for his sheep and surrounds them with love. Talk with your child about the care your family members give to each other. Display the Good Shepherd poster from your child's lesson booklet. Write the names of family members on the sheep, and paste them on the poster.

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child learned that Jesus promised in Sunday's Gospel that no one shall take his sheep from him. He is a Good Shepherd. Ask your child to teach the family how to play the game, "Safe or Scatter," and play it together. Talk about ways each of you helps to care for members of your family.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week's Gospel tells us that Jesus cares for us all like a shepherd cares for the sheep. The class learned that we all belong to Jesus, and one sign that shows we belong to Jesus is the Sign of the Cross. Make sure that your home displays the crucifix. Kneeling before the crucifix is a good spot for a family night prayer, too. Ask your child to help the family remember to say a prayer of thanks before each meal this week. Ask your child about how the Sign of the Cross also applies to the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week's Gospel of the Good Shepherd helped your youngster's class understand that good leaders know their followers and are responsible for others. Ask your young person to tell how leaders in the Church are shepherds. Let your son or daughter teach the family the "Who Makes Church Happen Today?" game, and play the game together. Be sure to have your youngster tell about King Christian as well as what happened in the city of Assisi, Italy, during World War II.

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Guide

Visions (Grades 7–9): Your son or daughter learned how environmental issues affect us all. The class learned that just as Jesus is the Good Shepherd who cares for people, people have the duty to care for and "shepherd" creation. Talk about ways your family can care for creation, too. Ask your youngster to share what the class learned about the journeys of Saint Paul that spread the Good News throughout the Greek world. Be sure to ask your youngster to describe the Doctor of the Church the class learned about this week.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

Pray Together

When you complete your conversation about the week's Gospel lesson, pray together a few verses of Psalm 23: "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I lack. In green pastures he makes me lie down; to still waters he leads me; he restores my soul. Indeed, goodness and mercy will pursue me all the days of my life; I will dwell in the house of the Lord for endless days" (1–2, 6). You can find the full text of this psalm in your family Bible or in most missalettes.
