Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the celebration of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, also know as Corpus Christi. I have been listening to a multi-day podcast on the Gospel of Luke. During one episode, the presenter said, "He chooses the unchosen to change the world." All three of our readings are living examples of that: Abram, Paul and the unlikely crew known as the disciples. Even when God chose to break into the world, he didn't come as a mighty force, he came as a tiny, helpless baby.

A part of the All Saints Parish mission statement is to *Make Disciples*. Do we see ourselves as disciples or disciples in the making? Tim Glemkowski in his book, Made for Mission, asserts that, "the decision to be a disciple is always made in the context of a relationship. As Jesus says, 'Believe in me.' To become a disciple is to respond affirmatively to the invitation to have a personal relationship with God." I do not believe that I have yet to read a part of the Bible where a person looks up toward the sky and suddenly shouts, choose me, God, choose me. I have read many, many books where God asks an unsuspecting and unassuming person to step out of their comfort zone and enter into a personal and transforming relationship. The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes this transformation: "By faith, man completely submits his intellect and will to God. With his whole being man gives his assent to God the revealer. Sacred

Today's Gospel reflects this obedience of faith given by the apostles to Jesus. It's the end of long day of teaching and healing. The Twelve cared enough about the crowd to approach Jesus and call his attention to their needs of nourishment and rest. Jesus turns the table and challenges the disciples to feed the crowd. Each of their faces would have told a different story. There would have been incredulity, disbelief, a smirk or two, an eye roll, and perhaps even outright laughter.

Scripture calls this human response to God, the author of revelation, 'the obedience of faith'" (CCC 143).

I find this to be true in my own life: even as we grow as disciples, we get too comfortable in the spot we are at and have similar reactions when Jesus challenges us to take the next step. We forget how far God has already brought us on our faith journey. None of the apostles took the time to remember where they were at in life when Jesus invited them to follow him and said yes. What precedes our Gospel reading today is that Jesus had shared his power with the apostles and they had gone out to teach, preach and heal on their own. And they had done it! Jesus had transformed this unlikely group of people into one that now had "power and authority over all demons and to cure diseases, and he sent them to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal." Through our baptism, we share in the life, ministry and death of our Lord, Jesus Christ. "The baptized become 'living stones' to be 'built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood.' By baptism they share in the priesthood of Christ, in his prophetic and royal mission. They are a 'chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, that [they] may declare the wonderful deeds of him who called [them] out of darkness into his marvelous light (CCC 1268).

So why do we continue to hesitate when God calls us to more? One answer may be that no matter how much we have grown as a disciple, in true humility, we continue to feel so small and inadequate. While that is understandable, that is not how our baptismal call; our faith; the multiplicity of stories from the Bible and all the examples of the saints would have us respond. What we have to offer is imperfect and it always will be. But, when we offer all that we have, no matter how imperfect; no matter how small, God receives this as a perfect gift from us, because it was given freely and with love. Our lowly gift is then blessed and multiplied, just like the loaves and the fish. It becomes so abundant that there is more than enough to meet the need. So why do we continue to give God less than our all? There are many reasons and each person has their own. I have shared many times that I have a very hard time letting someone else, including God, direct life for me. Many things have happened on my life journey and no matter how many times God has provided way more than I asked for or needed, I am most comfortable when I rely on myself. But that is not being a strong person of faith, that is being a coward. Like the lion in the Wizard of Oz, I can lack the courage I need at times to say "yes" to God. I often pray, Lord, I believe...help my unbelief. Whether our hearts have a tiny hole, a significant tear or the whole thing is damaged, let's pray for the courage to offer our heart, the entirety of our heart, imperfect and full of flaws to God. God will receive this gift with much joy and he will heal, renew and grow it beyond our wildest dreams. We will be satisfied and the basket of leftovers will be overflowing. What do you need to let go of in order to give your all to Jesus?

A great question to wrestle with and to take to prayer. See you at Mass!

June 22, 2025 • Body & Blood of Christ • Luke 9:11b-17

Feeding the Five Thousand

Great crowds of people were gathered to hear Jesus speak. They had followed him a great distance from the town. The apostles suggest that Jesus dismiss the crowd so they can find food in the surrounding farms and villages. Instead Jesus provides for the crowd by blessing five loaves and two fish, and sure enough, "[A]ll ate and were filled. What was left over was gathered up, twelve baskets of broken pieces" (v. 17).

The story of the feeding of the multitude is a Eucharist story. At Eucharist, we, too, gather to listen and be fed by Jesus. And like the people on that hilltop, we, too, are all satisfied.

The Eucharist was Jesus' lasting gift to his followers. It was his way of being present in a very concrete way throughout the ages. When we receive the host and drink from the cup, we know that Jesus is truly with us and in us. And as we watch our brothers and sisters receive from the same cup, we realize again that we are one: the body of Christ given up for the world. Take time to celebrate elements of the Eucharist at home.

The Eucharist is a meal. We remember the Last Supper, the breaking of the bread, the blessing of the wine. The time your family sits together at table is sacred, too. Say a prayer when you begin. Treat each other with the respect you would pay to Jesus.

The Eucharist is a sacrifice. At the preparation of the altar we respond, "May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands...". Parents know about sacrifice—giving up sleep to comfort a restless child, wearing retread sneakers so a teen can have new soccer shoes. We are doing our children a disservice if we don't teach them to sacrifice, too. Children need to learn the discipline of choosing a greater good.

The Eucharist is a celebration of new life. We become a part of Christ's body, sharing in his Spirit. In Eucharistic Prayer III the priest says, "Grant that we... may... become one body, one spirit in Christ." You and your children experience your life in Christ's through the give-and-take of everyday family life. Help your children to also experience that life with the larger church family by becoming involved in parish activities.

The Eucharist is a family affair. We celebrate it with our parish family, and we live it day in and day out with our household family.
