Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Two weeks ago Fr. Jack read a letter to the parish from Archbishop Zinkula inviting all of us to embark on a new path - a Journey in Faith. This week, I would like for you to note that there will be no daily Mass on Thursday, July 17 in addition to the new norm of no daily Mass on Wednesdays. The Archbishop has asked all priests and parish life coordinators in the Archdiocese of Dubuque to gather to begin to focus on leadership and prayerful discernment of the Journey in Faith Pastoral Planning initiative. I will also ask that you plan to attend one of the 34 planned regional information sessions that will be held from Saturday, September 6 through Monday, September 29. All Saints will be hosting two of these meetings on Tuesday, September 16 and Wednesday, September 17 from 6:00 - 9:00

PM in the sanctuary. These meetings will outline possibilities for changes in leadership, Mass times and locations for every parish in the Archdiocese. Stay tuned as more information is available.

As a society many of us have become overthinkers - finding nuances, hidden meaning and additional choices, where there are none to be found. Moses seems to be addressing the people in this same vein. Of all the commandments that Moses brought to the people, the ones that are most essential are that we love the Lord, our God, above everything and everyone else and that we treat others as we would like to be treated - with love, compassion and value. Whether Moses is genuinely confused by the lack of understanding or perhaps being just a tad sarcastic (is this where the art of eye-rolling started?!), he seems to be chastising the people for not grasping and living that which in his mind is such a simple concept. "For this command that I enjoin on you today is not too mysterious and remote for you. It is not up in the sky, that you should say, 'Who will go up in the sky to get it for us and tell us of it, that we may carry it out?' Nor is it across the sea, that you should say, 'Who will cross the sea to get it for us and tell us of it, that we may carry it out?'" Moses continues with words that come to my heart everyday when I read the news: "No, it is something very near to you, already in your mouths and in your hearts; you have only to carry it out." Love God. Love yourself as a child of God. Love our neighbors - all of them.

Jesus also is responding to an overthinker in today's Gospel reading. Scholars often asked teachers (rabbis) questions so as to determine their philosophy and their authenticity. But then the scholar takes it one step further and gets a lesson of a lifetime. In today's world think of a reporter asking a legitimate question, but then he/she tries to trip up the person being interviewed with a 'gotcha' question. Jesus, like he so often does, turns the tables on the scholar.

In the podcast, Luke in 50 Days, the speakers identify the parable of the good Samaritan as Jesus defining how to know, evaluate or measure our adherence or understanding of the First Commandment. God knows how well we love him by how we show our love of neighbor. As the podcasters point out, this parable has a lot of depth and a lot of reality about the hard choices that we as children of God are called to make everyday. This parable isn't about who is "nice" - it's about real-life ethical and moral decisions that we have to make and how God looks at the world through the lenses of love and law. Both the Jewish priest and the Levite (who was a member of the priestly class) struggled with the law that said that if they touched blood or a dying person, then they couldn't touch the sacrifice, which was a part of their vocational duty and how they served the people. It's how they showed love of God and love of neighbor. This situation brings both the priest and the Levite smack up against a moral dilemma - do I follow the law of love or do I follow Jesus' law of love? We've all been in situations just like this in our lifetime. The priest and the Levite aren't "bad" people. They chose the law, because in their mind and heart, they were able to serve "the many" by walking away from "the one." (Reminds me of an old Star Trek episode where Spock (as he is dying) tells Captain Kirk not to try to save him because the needs of the many outweigh the needs of the few or the one.)

Likewise, the Samaritan isn't just a "nice" person. He, too, has to confront an ethical and moral dilemma. Both the Jews and the Samaritans had an equal ethnic hatred of one another. The Samaritan was in Jewish land and by putting the injured man on his animal and taking him to an inn, he risked and surely encountered much prejudice along the way. In fact, in taking the man to a public place, the Samaritan could have been easily accused of being the one who beat the man up in the first place. The Samaritan also risked being ostracized by his own people for helping a Jew. Sounding familiar, anyone?

I invite all of us to sit with this parable several times this week. It's not a simple good versus bad. It is about real life ethical and moral choices we are called to make. I invite us to look at our own lives and our own prejudices and ask the question, "in this situation how was I or how could I have been neighbor to ______ "(fill in the blank.) As we wrestle with our own answers, I pray that our hearts become a little more like Jesus and we can rise above some of the "law" in our life and focus on treating one another with mercy. "Go and do likewise." Praying with you always.

Healthy Kids Iowa Distribution

MCO hosted the first of our three distributions last week for HKI. Households with children ages 4 to 18, with income at 185% or below of the Federal Poverty Level, or who are eligible for The Emergency Food Assistance Program, can participate this summer. Our volunteers greeted the families, helped complete the paperwork, assisted with shopping, bagged groceries, carried out food to vehicles. Our staff described it as organized chaos, as we had no idea how many

families to expect. Our tallies showed that, in just two hours, we served 58 families, with a total of 195 eligible children! It was both a fun night and a learning experience for all involved.

We will host two more times this summer, at the end of July, and the end of August.

July 13, 2025 • 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time • Luke 10:25-37

The Parable of the Good Samaritan

Jesus discusses the great commandment: to love God with your whole heart, soul and mind, and your neighbor as yourself. He is then asked the question, "And who is my neighbor?" (v.29). Jesus answers with the parable of the Good Samaritan—the story of one man rescuing another. The rescuer belongs to a group of longtime adversaries of the Jews, the Samaritans. He helps a beaten man who was ignored by two of his countrymen. When Jesus finishes the story he asks, "Which of these three, do you think, was the neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" (v. 36).

Jesus answers his own question very clearly in this parable: Even the person you trust least is your neighbor. The Samaritan, despised by the Jews, helps a Jew. He goes out of his way to make sure the injured man is taken care of. The story is a testimony not only to who our neighbor is, but also to what it means to be a neighbor.

The Samaritan doesn't just stop to help the injured man; he carries him on his own animal to an inn where he leaves instructions with the innkeeper to take care of him. He even leaves enough money to pay for the injured man's needs, offering to pay any additional charges on his return.

This story reminds me of the illustration of a young boy carrying a smaller child on his shoulders, the sketch that accompanies the motto for Boys Town: "He ain't heavy; he's my brother." That is the lesson of the parable with the underlying awareness that we are all brothers and sisters.

When we see or even hear about someone in need, we are asked to put our own misgivings and prejudices aside and lift them up, just as the Samaritan did, just as the youngster commemorated in the illustration did, just as Christ is willing to do for us each time we fail or need to be carried.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Go through a newspaper or a newsmagazine together and find pictures of people from another culture or country. Talk about what the picture tells you about the way they live. Imagine what it would be like to trade places with them.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Prejudice is something that is subtly passed from generation to generation. What prejudices did the family you grew up in have? Do you hold the same prejudices? How do you handle prejudice?
