What is Journey in Faith?

Journey in Faith is the pastoral planning process for the Archdiocese of Dubuque to renew discipleship, strengthen our Catholic communities, and align parish structures. It is a response to real challenges - but grounded in hope and trust in the Holy Spirit. Every parish will be involved in shaping the future.

How will this impact my parish?

Every parish in the Archdiocese will be grouped with other parishes to create a "Pastorate". Each Pastorate will have one pastor and usually one or more other priests called "Parochial Vicars" (previously called Associate Pastors.) This process will also involve:

- Enhanced collaboration with nearby parishes for operations and ministries
- Sharing clergy and parish staff
- Adjustments to Mass times and/or locations
- Consideration of future mergers of parishes within the newly formed pastorates

Will parishes be closing?

No final decisions have been made. The focus of "Journey in Faith" during 2025-2026 is about organizing groups of parishes into pastorates with a designated number of Masses to be held at specific locations. Due to the goals of having fuller Masses with more vibrant liturgies, not all parishes will be able to have weekend Masses. Since all parishes within a pastorate will be working very collaboratively together, there is an expectation that over time all parishes within the pastorate will ultimately "merge" into one parish.

Why is this happening now?

The Archdiocese faces several significant challenges:

- A growing secular culture and declining sacramental participation, which includes low Mass attendance and few baptisms, Catholic marriages, and religious vocations
- Fewer priests to serve our 160 parishes
- The need to steward resources, both human and financial, more effectively

We must address these concerns to continue sharing the Gospel and to support a vibrant Catholic presence in Northeast Iowa (the Archdiocese of Dubuque) for generations to come.

Who will lead these efforts?

The archdiocese is leading these efforts and has partnered with Catholic Leadership Institute (CLI) to help coordinate our processes for gathering feedback. CLI has assisted many other dioceses in these types of efforts. All final decisions, however, will be made by Archbishop Zinkula after he has reviewed all feedback from the September, October and November meetings at local parishes and considered recommendations from various advisory bodies.

As the pastor, our Parish Life Coordinator, Tracy Huk, was tasked to identify 3-6 parish leaders to serve on our Journey in Faith team. The members of the team for All Saints are: Steve Schmitz, team leader; Stacy Cataldo, Ann Jeffries, Deacon Ed Martin, Stephanie Klappholz, and Tracy Huk. Our team has been trained by CLI and will facilitate our parish sessions to gather your responses to proposals for pastorate groupings. Additional ideas and options that you present will also be submitted for consideration.

Archdiocesan Journey in Faith Site (cont.)

How will decisions be made?

The Archdiocese will propose models of groupings of parishes (called pastorates) at the September 16th and 17th meetings at All Saints. We will schedule meetings in October and November to gather parishioner feedback. Individuals may always submit feedback on their own through the Journey in Faith website. Final decisions will be made in alignment with:

- Church law (canon law)
- Geography, travel times and demographics
- Parish vitality and financial viability
- Clergy availability aligned with matching the gifts of priests to pastorates

Pastors, parish leadership and parishioners will have an active role in shaping the recommendations. The Archbishop will make final decisions after extensive consultation and collaboration.


Why Should I Attend?


A Weekly Tip on Caring for Our Common Home

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Our reading today from Hebrews runs parallel to the words of Archbishop Zinkula in our Journey in Faith initiative: keep our focus on Jesus and do not let ourselves be distracted by opposition and weariness.

Mary Healy in her commentary on Hebrews identifies "three images that help us to see the Christian life in true perspective. First, our life is an endurance race, in which we are striving toward the finish line, cheered on by those who have gone before us." We are naïve and misinformed if we believe that this is the first time the Catholic faith and the Christian community has encountered and lived through

periods of opposition and trials. The vitality of our communities has ebbed and flowed throughout not just our North American history, but, indeed from the very beginning. We are on a leg of the journey where the culture of our time encourages many to turn away from God and to focus on ourselves and our accumulation of material possessions. In our baptism, we are strengthened through the holy Oil of the Catechumen and the holy oil of Sacred Chrism. But strengthened does not mean invincible. God gave us the gift of free will, so our life is a struggle. Jesus knew temptation and so do we through earthly burdens and sin.

"Second, [our life should be] growth toward maturity [in faith] through the discipline of loving [the] Father." Each time we endure a trial or a hardship and keep our focus on God through prayer and trust, we strengthen our connection to Him and become stronger for the next leg of the journey. It is in our sufferings that we should turn to the wisdom and example set by the leaders chosen by God; known through the Old Testament, the New Testament and the Saints; with the ultimate example being God's Son, Jesus Christ, the "leader and perfecter of faith." This "great crowd of witnesses" that surrounds us is not passive. They are actively watching our journey, cheering us on, and interceding for us when we turn to them for assistance. Mary is our greatest intercessor and the ideal witness for keeping our eyes fixed on our Lord and Savior and not on the everyday trials that are a part of our human pilgrimage here on earth.

The third image used in Hebrews to help us see the Christian life in true perspective is the "joyous liturgical assembly on a holy mountain amid all the angels and saints." As St. Paul wrote in his letter to the Corinthains, through a faithful and faith-filled journey on earth "now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now [we] know in part; then [we] shall know fully, even as [we] have been fully known." We are human, we don't like to be uncomfortable and sad through suffering. It is only through these trials, though, that we learn utter dependence on God and the joy that is the fruit of keeping our eyes firmly fixed on Him.

The Journey in Faith initiative will be viewed by many as a trial and a burden. Let's keep our eyes fixed on God and our hearts turned to prayer for guidance. The goal is to renew discipleship and strengthen parish life through a greater participation in fruitful liturgies and Christian communities. It will be viewed by many as too radical. Keeping our focus on God, we must acknowledge that it is a response to real challenges - but grounded in hope and trust in the Holy Spirit. Growing our hearts through ever-deepening encounters with Christ will keep our focus on God, the Father; God, the Son; and God, the Holy Spirit. Although blunt and to the point, we should keep the words of Paul to the Hebrews in mind when we find ourselves burdened and struggling with potential outcomes through the Journey in Faith initiative: "Consider how [Jesus] endured such opposition from sinners, in order that [we] may not grow weary and lose heart. In [our] struggle against sin [we] have not yet resisted to the point of shedding blood."

Every voice is important and matters on this journey. Upcoming informational sessions will be at All Saints on September 16th and 17th from 6 - 9 PM. Additional meetings will be scheduled in October and led by our Journey in Faith Team to gather feedback and ideas. Please get these dates on your calendar now - make them a priority! Come listen and pray. We need every member present to discern how to build a vibrant Church for future generations. Let us Journey in Faith.

Jesus as Cause for Division

In this short excerpt from the Gospel of Luke, Jesus tells his disciples that he has come to bring fire to the earth. He will be a source of division in households: father against son, mother against daughter and so on. "From now on five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three..." (v. 52).

Being a peacemaker is just part of the job description for parents. Squabbles over whogets the last cookie, who pushed whom first and whose turn it is on the computer are normal household occurrences. The secret to peace on the home front is finding solutions that strengthen relationships.

Peace is not the opposite of conflict. It is a way of solving disagreements without hurting each other physically or emotionally—and certainly without resorting to violence. In their book Parenting for Peace and Justice, Jim and Kathy McGinnis offer a four-step approach to bringing about peaceful solutions in volatile situations.

They tell us that unless children are threatening or engaging in abusive actions, it is best for parents to stay out of the argument. Children need to learn how to broker their own disagreements. When someone is hurting or threatening another, however, you need to step in and separate the youngsters. Send them to different spots to cool down and think over the situation.

After a little time, go to each child and listen (without comment) to his or her story. Bring the children together with the understanding that they will have a certain amount of time to solve the problem by themselves before you impose your own solution. The McGinnises report that because their solutions were almost always less tolerable than their children's, mutual solutions were usually found.

Learning to deal with conflict in a peaceful way is a valuable skill—certainly one the world needs. And by teaching our youngsters to be peacemakers, we are helping them realize their call to be children of God.


