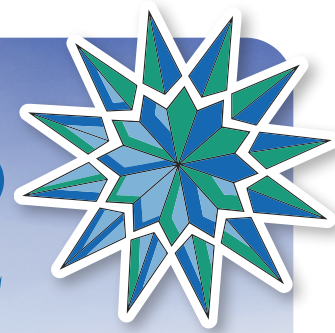

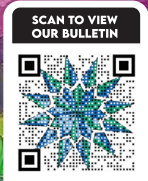

Only Non-Perishable Food Items, Please!

Food pantries fall under strict food safety guidelines, covering transport, handling, and storage. Clients trust the food we give them is safe and free from contaminants, just as each of us trusts the food we purchase at any grocery store or restaurant.

Any perishable items -- items that need to stay refrigerated or frozen, must come to us directly from commercial vendors, who are also required by health codes to comply with specific food safety standards during holding and transport. For this reason, we are unable to accept frozen or refrigerated items that are donated from well intentioned private donors. We need to be certain food has not thawed and been refrozen, left at room temperature, or even in a hot car. There is just no way to do this with a multitude of personal donations. We have experienced donors who have left food donations by our door, outside, after hours, in the weather. Unfortunately we cannot distribute these contributions. We welcome ALL nonperishable, shelf stable food items within their current expiration dates, in the original packaging, AND fresh garden produce.

Other items we do not accept: adult diapers, baby food, children's toys/clothing, household supplies (such as lamps, furniture, linens), and clothing (socks/underwear OK).

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to Easter Sunday. Our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, is Risen. He is Risen indeed!

We are but a few days away from knowing to which Pastorate we will belong, who will be our Pastor, who will be our Parochial Vicar(s) and if All Saints has been designated as a place for weekend Masses. Like Lent, the wait has been challenging, full of ups and downs, and filled with cautious hope. No matter what the outcome, St. Paul in his first letter to the Corinthians and in his letter to the Colossians, has some words for us to pray over this week as we conclude this leg of our Journey in Faith.

We have two options for this Sunday's liturgy and both have advice for transitioning our reaction to the announcement into a response. From chapter 3 verses 1-4 of Paul's letter to the Colossians: "Brothers and sisters: If then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Think of what is above, not of what is on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory." Paul sets his expectation right from the start. We are all addressed as brother and sisters. And, indeed, we are. We are not a parishioner from this church or a parishioner from that church. As we either welcome God's children into the physical structure of All Saints or we are welcomed into another church, we are first and foremost, brothers and sisters in Christ. We have been baptized into Christ's life and death, and like Christ, after a long and often arduous pilgrimage to Jerusalem, we have been raised with Christ. Christ is our anchor, our focal point and our spiritual home - not any bricks and mortar structure. Let's change our reaction of anger, disappointment, glee or triumphant gloating to a response of living a life with Christ and for Christ with our brothers and sisters.

Paul's 1st letter to the Corinthians, chapter 5, verses 6-8, gives us more food for thought (yes, I hope to bring a smile with the pun!): "Brothers and sisters: Do you not know that a little yeast leavens all the dough? Clear out the old yeast, so that you may become a fresh batch of dough, inasmuch as you are unleavened. For our paschal lamb, Christ, has been sacrificed. Therefore, let us celebrate the feast, not with the old yeast, the yeast of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth." No matter what the result of the Journey in Faith announcement, let's clear out the old yeast of his, her, mine and their. Our fresh batch of dough via the Pastorate should be a bowl of we, us, and our. Do not wish for anything but God's goodness for the Pastorate as a whole; do not be guided by division. Let's fold mercy, love, forgiveness and cooperation into our dough.

A recent article in the Vatican News by Andrea Monda reflected on the connection between J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Lord of the Rings* and politics in our world. I'd like to offer two paragraphs, which on their own, have much to offer along with Paul's words: "The strongest or the most arrogant do not win, but the humble - one might say the humorists, the ones capable of laughing at themselves and serving not their own ego and desires, but a greater design, a mission which they do not even fully understand. This is a mission that succeeds because it is carried out not by great heroes, but by a ragtag company, a caravan of pilgrims rather than a selection of ruthless and efficient soldiers, an open, inclusive company, as one might say today, where people who differ in every respect (ethnicity, talent, lineage, origin, and above all desire) find themselves walking together, collaborating, discovering that the other is much more similar and, in general, much 'more' than they appeared at the outset. Difference is richness, contamination is wisdom, mixing is the path that leads to victory. The other, therefore, is precious, decisive. Not only the other, but also the enemy, as in the case of Gollum, or even the Balrog. The most powerful line in the novel in this sense is the one spoken by the wizard Gandalf when he recalls his battle with the monstrous creature: 'In that despair, my enemy was my only hope'."

My brothers and sisters, we are not enemies, we are a family in Christ. Together we are united in the hope of sharing the love, mercy and forgiveness of our awesome God. Together we are united in the life, death and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. And together we seek the counsel of the Holy Spirit so as to know and do our Father's will, thus building up God's kingdom here on Earth. Monda continues, "In today's world, polarized and torn by conflicts between opposing extremisms, how much we need to rediscover the beauty of mediation, to inhabit 'Middle-earth,' reconciling conflicting parties and making the value of the 'halfling' prevail over the rhetoric of the superman. It would be beautiful if we could draw inspiration from Tolkien's imagination, and adopt its language too: for example, one could speak of 'Middle-earth,' to emphasize the importance of mediation and avoid the terrible spell of purity, or recover the symbol of athelas, the 'king's leaf' with therapeutic power. The king as healer, a man of healing: this is a beautiful image of a power that tends the wounds and pains of the people, accompanying them in the trials of life. 'To accompany' is the right verb... to be 'in the midst' of the people, becoming a traveling companion of the common man, with a gaze of mercy, because, in the end, we are all halflings who need the other to reach fulfillment."

In love, let us embrace one another as brothers and sisters. We are all walking on the journey of life and Christ has already won salvific victory for us. We need not focus on division, but on what does and will unite us. Come Holy Spirit.

April 5, 2026 • Easter Sunday • John 20:1–9

He is Risen!

This reading of Mark's version of the resurrection is rather short. In it the women see a young man clothed in a white robe who shows them the place where Jesus' body had been laid. He tells them to go tell the disciples and Peter.

Imagine the emotion and excitement the disciples must have felt when they realized Jesus had risen. Sometimes I think I have listened to the Jesus story so often that those three words sound like the “they-lived-happily-ever-after” to Jesus' life. I forget how powerfully momentous an event this was for the world. Easter is a big feast day, a huge holiday—even more significant than Christmas.

Easter is our Alleluia day: the day we were released from bondage. This is the day fear, loneliness, greed, prejudice and even death lost their power over us. Easter is a new-life day—a “We are reborn” day! It is truly an Alleluia day.

This is the year to make Easter a big deal, even if you are reading this on Easter evening, it is not too late to do some planning. Have an Easter party. Make it a surprise party for the family. (That first Easter was sure a surprise for everybody.) Or, have the family help plan it. Invite friends, and the extended family. If you want, have an Easter egg hunt. Or play “Pin the tail on the lamb.”

Spend some time during the party to talk a bit about why this day is so special. Explaining why eggs and lambs are symbols for Easter is a good way to introduce the topic of new life. Be creative; reenact the resurrection story. Talk about what the apostles must have thought and felt when they saw the empty tomb.

If you are reading this reflection out of sequence with the church year, and it's not Easter, have an Easter party next Sunday anyway. After all, every Sunday is a memorial of Christ risen—a celebration of our Easter joy.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 20:1-9 and John 20:19-31

This week's Gospel at Home covers two Sundays. The Gospel for Easter tells of Mary of Magdalene's visit to the tomb and her discovery that Jesus was not there. The Gospel for the following Sunday describes Jesus' appearance to his disciples, his greeting of peace, and his gift of the Holy Spirit.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Easter celebrates new life. Children see new life in growing things in nature. Your child this week learned that Jesus is risen on Easter. Sometime during these two weeks take a walk in a park or in the country. Look for signs of new life and talk with your child about the gift of life.

Promise (Grades K-1): In class, your child made two story strips that tell the Gospel stories from Easter and the 2nd Sunday of Easter. Ask them to share the stories with the family and talk about the joy Mary Magdalene and the followers of Jesus had when they found Jesus was alive. How can your family share Easter joy with others?

Good News (Grades 2-3): Ask your child to tell you what Mary Magdalene found when she went to Jesus' tomb. Share the story of Jesus' visit to his followers. Follow the instructions in the last page of the Good News booklet to make an Easter candle for your family. Light your candle—with fire or your imagination—each evening during the season of Easter, and say or sing with your family: "Alleluia."

Venture (Grades 4-6): Your son or daughter experienced an Easter Vigil prayer and dramatized the Gospels for both Easter Sunday and the 2nd Sunday of Easter. The class also learned about the conversion of Saint Paul and about the early witnesses to the Resurrection

and how those witnesses spread the Good News. If your family attended the Easter Vigil, talk about your favorite parts of the Mass. Say the prayer on the cover of this week's lesson book together and light a candle to signify the start of the Easter season. Talk about ways your family witnesses to Jesus' Resurrection.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Both Sunday Gospels that are a part of this lesson taught your young person that Easter faith makes all things new. Part of that Easter faith is the call to be witnesses to Jesus' Resurrection. For the people in the Gospel stories, the great sorrow of their loss was turned to great joy when they realized that Jesus had been raised from the dead. Talk about losses your family has experienced. What did you feel? What did you do? Ask your son or daughter to share how he or she felt while reading the story about Toby. Commit as a family to take time to enjoy one another's company during the days of Easter.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with *Awaken*, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.



Pray Together

One of the important parts of the Easter Vigil service is the celebration of Baptism and the renewal of your own baptismal promises. If you still have your family's baptismal candles and certificates, display them during the first two weeks of Easter. Say your morning or evening prayer in front of the display and renew your own baptismal vows.
