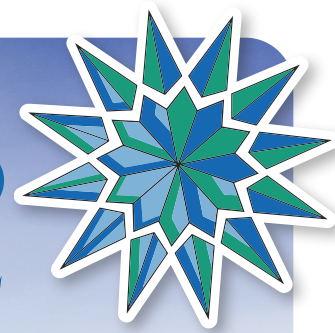

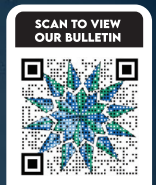

# Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 2nd Sunday of Easter, Sunday of Divine Mercy and at All Saints - the celebration of the Sacrament of 1st Holy Communion. This weekend in the Archdiocese of Dubuque we also come to know to which Pastorate our church is assigned, who will be our Pastor and Parochial Vicar(s) and if our church will have a weekend Mass. No matter the outcome, we will experience many emotions. The apostles and disciples of Christ, provide a map for 'where do we go from here?'. Our reading from Acts 2:42-47 gives us the big picture view as well as the directions for how to get there: They [the people of God] devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of

bread and to the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, and many wonders and signs were done through the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their property and possessions and divide them among all according to each one's need. Every day they devoted themselves to meeting together in the temple area and to breaking bread in their homes. They ate their meals with exultation and sincerity of heart, praising God and enjoying favor with all the people. And every day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved."

What a divine opportunity for Catholics in the Archdiocese of Dubuque to show the world how to respond to pain and suffering; to the challenges of life and the solutions in which everyone bears a part of the burden, especially during this most holy time of Easter and the Sundays following.

The world is gleefully anticipating anger, denial, wailing and gnashing of teeth from those parishes who will not be designated to have weekend Masses. The world is eagerly awaiting the arrogant and condescending behavior from those who will have a weekend Mass. To react in such a manner is not only contradictory to the post-Resurrection response of the apostles, but only emphasizes the pursuit of transitory pleasures. As Catholic Christians we know and celebrate that the fullness of life is realized in a personal and communal relationship with Jesus Christ; not what building we celebrate weekend Mass. If we need a more contemporary visual for this - think of the Grinch in how the Grinch Stole Christmas. He took away all of what he thought defined Christmas joy for the residents of Whoville. He paced back and forth as he waited for them to awaken and react to the disappearance of their Christmas material possessions. He wanted them to be devastated; to abandon the celebration of Christmas because the "trappings" were all gone. But the Whos in Whoville totally surprise the Grinch, for they know that the joy and celebration of Christmas is found in the shared relationships we have with one another and is not dependent on material things. We, as Catholic Christians, know that our joy is found in a relationship with God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and in loving and supporting one another. That is the joy and fruit - not buildings.

The reading from 1 Peter also turns our attention away from that which is too little for us. We, as sons and daughters, were graced by our heavenly Father with a "new birth to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." It is in this that we rejoice, not the smallness of behavior based on where weekend Masses will be located.

We rejoice in the new life in and with Christ that we have been given! Our inheritance is the salvation won for us by Jesus Christ. Our inheritance is not places and things. "In this [we] rejoice, although now for a little while [we] may have to suffer through various trials, so that the genuineness of [our] faith, more precious than gold that is perishable even though tested by fire, may prove to be for praise, glory, and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ." So let's take our cue from the Whos in Whoville and after the announcements are made, instead of 'Welcome Christmas', let's sing out loud and strong:

Come Holy Spirit!

# Family Ministry

April 12, 2026 • 2nd Sunday of Easter • John 20:19-31

## Focusing on Forgiveness

*On the evening of the Resurrection, the disciples locked themselves in the house in which they were staying. Jesus came and stood among them. He offers them peace, and tells them that he is sending them out just as his Father had sent him. He breathes on them and tells them to receive the Spirit.*

It is true. All we have to do is confess our sins, be truly sorry, and our sins are forgiven. This is true, of course, as long as we understand what being truly sorry means. There are more than words involved. Consider these three elements.

First, we say we are sorry. Our God is a God of love who calls all things to wholeness and harmony. When we act against love, we act against God, and we need to say the words that express our sorrow.

Second, we focus on change. If we say we are sorry and have no intention of changing our behavior, we can't be forgiven. Even God cannot free us from sin if we insist on holding onto it. Sometimes we are really sorry for our actions but can't muster the courage to change. In that case, we need to ask God for the desire to change. Even this small inclination to mend our ways is enough to loosen sin's grip and allow the Holy Spirit to slip in.

Third, we admit we are human. We humbly acknowledge that we need the Spirit's help to love the way God wants us to love. We face our limitations and our powerlessness and allow the Spirit's strength to fill us. We trust that, with God's help, we can overcome the most compelling sins or bad habits and become the person God calls us to be.

Teach your children what it means to say "I am sorry," and help them understand the three essential elements of forgiveness. Explain each element. Make sure they know the importance of asking for God's help to be strong throughout their day. And when they are not ready to forgive or to give up their anger, teach them to ask for God's help to let go.

## FAMILY RESPONSE

Adult family members may want to practice a simple Act of Contrition themselves, and then pray it together with their children as part of their bedtime prayers.

What bad habit, inclination, or attitude do you find difficult to break? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

## The Gospel at Home

### This Week's Gospel: John 20:1-9 and John 20:19-31

This week's Gospel at Home covers two Sundays. The Gospel for Easter tells of Mary of Magdalene's visit to the tomb and her discovery that Jesus was not there. The Gospel for the following Sunday describes Jesus' appearance to his disciples, his greeting of peace, and his gift of the Holy Spirit.

### Exploring the Gospel Message

**Seeds (Preschool):** Easter celebrates new life. Children see new life in growing things in nature. Your child this week learned that Jesus is risen on Easter. Sometime during these two weeks take a walk in a park or in the country. Look for signs of new life and talk with your child about the gift of life.

**Promise (Grades K-1):** In class, your child made two story strips that tell the Gospel stories from Easter and the 2nd Sunday of Easter. Ask them to share the stories with the family and talk about the joy Mary Magdalene and the followers of Jesus had when they found Jesus was alive. How can your family share Easter joy with others?

**Good News (Grades 2-3):** Ask your child to tell you what Mary Magdalene found when she went to Jesus' tomb. Share the story of Jesus' visit to his followers. Follow the instructions in the last page of the Good News booklet to make an Easter candle for your family. Light your candle—with fire or your imagination—each evening during the season of Easter, and say or sing with your family: "Alleluia."

**Venture (Grades 4-6):** Your son or daughter experienced an Easter Vigil prayer and dramatized the Gospels for both Easter Sunday and the 2nd Sunday of Easter. The class also learned about the conversion of Saint Paul and about the early witnesses to the Resurrection

and how those witnesses spread the Good News. If your family attended the Easter Vigil, talk about your favorite parts of the Mass. Say the prayer on the cover of this week's lesson book together and light a candle to signify the start of the Easter season. Talk about ways your family witnesses to Jesus' Resurrection.

**Visions (Grades 7-9):** Both Sunday Gospels that are a part of this lesson taught your young person that Easter faith makes all things new. Part of that Easter faith is the call to be witnesses to Jesus' Resurrection. For the people in the Gospel stories, the great sorrow of their loss was turned to great joy when they realized that Jesus had been raised from the dead. Talk about losses your family has experienced. What did you feel? What did you do? Ask your son or daughter to share how he or she felt while reading the story about Toby. Commit as a family to take time to enjoy one another's company during the days of Easter.

**Awaken (Teens/Adults):** Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with *Awaken*, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.



### Pray Together

One of the important parts of the Easter Vigil service is the celebration of Baptism and the renewal of your own baptismal promises. If you still have your family's baptismal candles and certificates, display them during the first two weeks of Easter. Say your morning or evening prayer in front of the display and renew your own baptismal vows.
