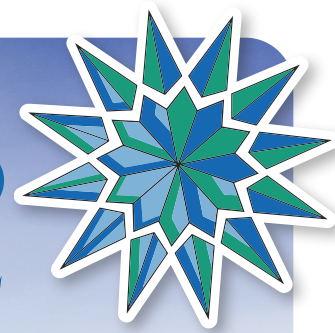
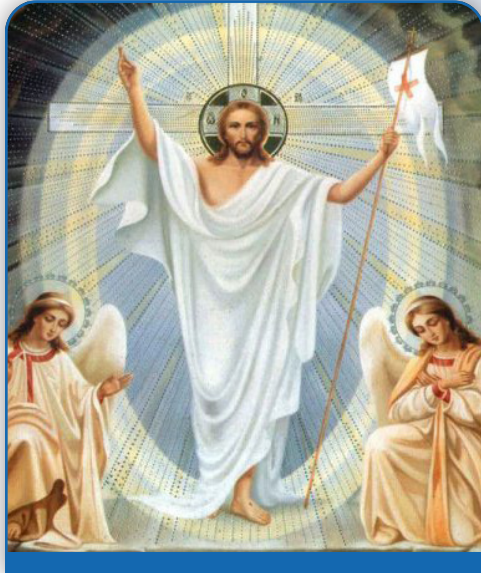

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The last time we celebrated a Mass in Ordinary Time was on November 16, 2025. Much has happened in our world and in our parish since that time; much of it making our hearts concerned and troubled. I feel that the sentiment heard at the beginning of our Gospel reading is still very accurate, despite the 2,000 years' difference in time: "At the sight of the crowds, Jesus' heart was moved with pity for them because they were troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd." We would (and frequently do) blame others for the discord and angst in our lives, but God (through Moses) spoke to the Israelites and still speaks to us today: "You have seen for yourselves how I treated the Egyptians and how I bore you up on eagle wings and brought you here to myself. Therefore, if you hearken to my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my special possession, dearer to me than all other people, though all the earth is mine. You shall be to me a kingdom of priests, a holy nation." And while the Israelites are very dear to God, we, brothers and sisters share in that covenant and that inheritance through the suffering, death and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Paul emphasizes this in his letter to the Romans, "Brothers and sisters: Christ, while we were still helpless, yet died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us."

Like most of our salvation history, much of life has been and still is a mess. We are a stiff-necked, prideful people who frequently live for ourselves and easily abandon the covenants that God has made with us. The result - a world filled with conflict, turmoil and suffering. So...what should be our course of action? Jesus showed us the path to follow and indeed, we re-present this model at the conclusion of every liturgy. Through our Baptism, we have become "a kingdom of priests." The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains, "The Christian faithful are those who, inasmuch as they have been incorporated in Christ through Baptism, have been constituted as the people of God; for this reason, since they have become sharers in Christ's priestly, prophetic, and royal office in their own manner, they are called to exercise the mission which God has entrusted to the Church to fulfill in the world, in accord with the condition proper to each one. In virtue of their rebirth in Christ there exists among all the Christian faithful a true equality with regard to dignity and the activity whereby all cooperate in the building up of the Body of Christ in accord with each one's own condition and function. The very differences which the Lord has willed to put between the members of his body serve its unity and mission. For 'in the Church there is diversity of ministry but unity of mission.' (871-873)."

Jesus summoned the 12 Apostles and we continue that apostolic tradition through the ordained priesthood and the diaconate. We are the diverse laborers who are sent to help with the harvest. In fact, two of the dismissal options - "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord" and "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life" are a clear re-presentation of Jesus' directive to the twelve: "As you go, make this proclamation: 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.'" Christian singer Matthew West has a song called Do Something that is a reminder that through our Baptism, we are the hands and feet of Christ in the world: "I woke up this morning; Saw a world full of trouble now; Thought, how'd we ever get so far down; How's it ever gonna turn around? So I turned my eyes to Heaven. I thought, 'God, why don't You do something?' Well, I just couldn't bear the thought of People living in poverty, Children sold into slavery...The thought disgusted me. So, I shook my fist at Heaven, Said, 'God, why don't You do something?' He said, 'I did, I created you.' If not us, then who? If not me and you - Right now, it's time for us to do something. If not now, then when Will we see an end To all this pain? It's not enough to do nothing; It's time for us to do something. I'm so tired of talking About how we are God's hands and feet. But it's easier to say than to be. Live like angels of apathy who tell ourselves, It's alright, 'somebody else will do something.' Well, I don't know about you, But I'm sick and tired of life with no desire. I don't want a flame, I want a fire. I wanna be the one who stands up and says, 'I'm gonna do something.' We are the salt of the earth. We are a city on a hill. But we're never gonna change the world By standing still."

Brothers and sisters, indeed the harvest is abundant. The world is full of individuals aching to hear the Gospel. We are the ones who can assist with the harvest. Pray for vocations, faithfully attend Sunday liturgy, come to Adoration, be a person who exemplifies the Gospel in how you live (actions can be more powerful than words!); volunteer time and talent as we become a Pastorate; be humble and be caring. We're never going to change our world by complaining - it's time to be an active part of the harvest!

Walking With Moms In Need



“If a woman with an unexpected or challenging pregnancy turned to you, would you know what help is available? Could a mom struggling to care for her young kids turn to your neighborhood Catholic church and find local assistance?”

This year, All Saints Parish has joined the Walking with Moms in Need outreach program in order to help young families experiencing difficulties.

When someone calls our “hotline” number, they speak to a team member in the Archdiocese, who then contacts a WWMIN volunteer in the parish closest to the person asking for help. The volunteers reach out to the woman in order to understand her needs and refer her to the appropriate resources or agencies.

We provide information as well as a sympathetic and listening heart when needed. Sometimes that is all a person needs to know, that they are not alone in their seemingly desperate situation, that there is help and hope for the future. We also check back to follow up and provide support until the need is resolved.

Even if you are unable to participate at this time, please pray the Walking With Moms Prayer for the women and families we hope to raise up.

Metro Catholic Outreach Calling All Volunteers



Can you give a couple of hours once or twice per month to help those with food insecurity right here in our city?

Our volunteer shifts only last about two hours, morning or afternoon, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, or Thursdays.

Our pantry volunteers organize incoming donations, check expiration dates, stock shelves, bag up snacks, toiletries, produce, and pack the food boxes.

Our distribution volunteers add the fresh items to the food boxes on the dock, greet our clients as they arrive to pick up their groceries, and help load the cars.

Our volunteers in the office answer the door and phones, schedule clients for their food pick-ups, assemble and distribute the homeless bags, organize clothing donations and other supplies.

We are in need of more volunteers, in the pantry, the distribution dock, and in the office. We promise you will never be bored!

Give Without Payment

Jesus continues to preach his message of forgiveness and love. As he looks out over the faces in the crowd, Scripture tells us his heart is moved because he sees so many people who are troubled and abandoned. "Like sheep without a shepherd," Jesus sees this as a universal problem and sends his apostles out into pagan lands to minister to all people.

We have all been blessed with unique gifts and talents, and like the apostles we are expected to appreciate them and freely share them. Unfortunately, for me it is much easier to talk and write about this fact than it is to take it to heart.

Sometimes just accepting that I have a gift is a problem. People tell me how good my stew is, and I will tell them it was way too salty. The fact is I am a pretty good cook, but it has taken me years to learn how to say a simple "thank you" to the person who gives me a compliment.

The point is even if your only gift is that you can make the best gosh darned oatmeal in the world, you should have the grace to share it with whomever you can. If you were gifted with a college education or a good profession, you should try to do some pro-bono work, sharing those gifts with folks who need your help.

Finally, God has gifted us with the privilege of parenting—accept it and practice it by helping your children discover their own gifts. Like Jesus did for his apostles, help them see their individual gifts and worth. Nurture them with love and compassion on a daily basis. And finally, affirm, counsel and support them as they learn to develop and share their gifts with others.

St. Stephen the Witness Catholic Student Center Appeal



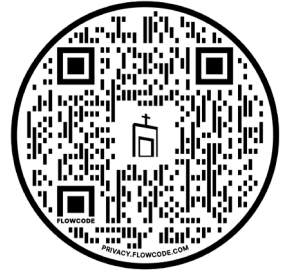
